CANAL NAVIGATION.

A correspondent of the Rochester Union and Advertiser ventilates a plan for the improvement of canal navigation, which is to divide the canal longitudinally into two distinct parts by running a timber near the surface of the water, supported on piles driven into the ground or bolted to the rock, one side of which shall be used by boats going west, and the other side by boats going east, with suitabe opening for boats to change sides when it is desirable to return. This, he thinks, would enable long trains of boats, like a railway train, drawn by powerful tugs, to make three miles per hour without damage to the banks or confusion in navigation. He GARLAND, MUTCHMOR & CO. urges that fewer boatmen would be required and that it would be more economical. But the plan is not altogether a new one.
