Runaway.—A gentleman named Donahue, from the Gatinneau, says there was a very heavy thunder storm above the Foothills on Wednesday. An immense quantity of rain fell during the night, and the creeks are considerably swollen this morning in consequence. Another gentleman from Gloucester speaks of a shower of rain having fallen yester evening.

A madman left this city by the Ottawa and Prescott R.R., yesterday, bound for the asylum at Beauport. His name is John Gainford, and came from some place in the Gatinneau. He was sent to the asylum at St. John some four years ago, and remained there ten months, and was sent home as cured. He was all right for one year after he came home, but took ill again, and got so wicked that he had to be kept chained for the last twelve months.

RUNAWAY.—A team of horses belonging to Mr. Thomas McKay became frightened by Messrs. Hick's advertisement, and when left for a moment at the flour mill at the Chaudiere, started off at a tremendous pace to the toll gate. The wagon to which they were attached struck another, belonging to Mr. Baldwin, and made a smash of it. The men working in Perley and Pette's yard one of their wagons across the road to stop the running team, but they leaped clear over it, smashing the two wagons by the collision. Then they bolted through the toll gate at great speed, but stopped of their own accord before they reached Hull. One of the horses, a fine chestnut, is very badly injured in the stifle and both hind legs; the other one escaped without a scratch.

IMMIGRATION.—A number of immigrants arrived on the noon train yesterday. 9 men, 3 women, and 4 children. They are English, and entirely ignorant of farm work, having always resided in a city. They left last night for Aylmer, and will start from there on the steamer this morning en route for Pembroke.
