Dr. J. A. Macdonald continues to improve in health, and a visible change for the better has taken place within the last three days.

The Hon. Mr. Atkins, Secretary of State of Canada, leaves town for the West this morning.

No decision as yet has been arrived at with regard to the Intercolonial Railway contracts.

Fires in the Woods are not confined to this continent. Several have lately occurred in Europe, and on Monday last part of the beautiful forest of Fontainebleau was destroyed.

The Railway Titans of the United States are again preparing to wage a suicidal war upon each other. Vanderbilt has at length come out in open hostility to the competing line, and has declared that all arrangements heretofore existing between the New York Central and Erie lines are null and void.

The British Columbia delegates are invited by our Government to attend the installation of His Royal Highness Prince Arthur at C. M. G. at Montreal, on the 11th inst. They will remain in that city a few days, and then return to Ottawa to conclude the business on which they are engaged.

We understand that the Council of Huntley have voted the sum of \$100 for the purpose of entertaining the officers and men of Captain Holmes' Company of Volunteers. They are invited to lunch in the grove near the Carp one day next week. The Council of Fitzroy have voted \$50 to aid the people of the townships in entertaining Captain Fraser's Company on Friday next. The Almonte and Pakenham companies will also be present.

Although the Fenians did not show much fight upon the border, some of them have been giving way to their warlike propensities since their return home. For instance we see that one John Gormley an officer of the late "army of liberation," who had just returned to Williamsburg, came behind an old man named Kernan as the latter was hobnobbing home, and dealt him a murderous blow with a blunt instrument, smashing in his skull and leaving him for dead. If arrested and brought to trial Gormley will probably avow that he smashed the old man's skull with a view to the "liberation of Ireland," upon which in accordance with the custom of the United States authorities, he will be discharged with a mild rebuke and a sentence to the cost of the Government!

The London Saturday Review and Daily News are terribly incensed against General Lindsay because he, in accordance with a practice generally prevailing among gentlemen, ventured to speak the truth. When he addressed the volunteers, he told them that it was their gallantry and ready patriotism that the country owed its safety, and not to the tardy movements of United States officials. Does any sane man who knows anything about the matter doubt the correctness of this? If we had depended upon President Grant alone, in fact we had relied upon the good faith of the Americans as much as we had a right to do, there would have been many a ruined home and many a mourning widow in Canada to-day. Every move made by the United States authorities was made to our late, and might almost as well have never been made at all. It is simply the height of impudence and the depth of enmity combined, for these papers which know nothing whatever about the situation, to take upon themselves to lecture General Lindsay.
