But there is employment here and plenty of it for thousands of able-bodied men, more especially those fitted for agricultural work, and if an immigrant only brings with him a willing heart and a pair of strong arms, we will not enquire too closely as to what amount of money he has in his purse.

We have alluded to this subject because we feel that it is a matter of the highest importance that the Canadian emigration movement should prove successful, and because we wish it to be clearly understood how any complaints arise which may now and then be made by disappointed emigrants. The question of Canadian emigration is one of the most important which could possibly engage the attention of British statesmen just now.

The last words which Dickens used in public were rather significant. At his farewell reading given about four months since, he bade adieu to the audience in the following terms:

From these garish lights I wish now to retire; with a heartfelt, grateful, and affectionate farewell—and I bid these as every one.
