The causes of the death of Dickens is

attributed by a London correspondent of

the Scotsman to the mental labor of writing "Edwin Drood." The writer says :-"Since his sudden seizure in the midst of his readings last year, Mr. Dickens has never been the same man. After a little while he began to go about as before, flitted to and fro in his ardent, restless way, took long walks after his favorite fashion, starting on the whim of the moment, at any hour, for anywhere, and resumed his 7) cents. Writing and other labors, but not with the same lightness and vivacity as before. He grew sooner wearied, both in walking and in work, and complained at 14 sents | times of a strange supineness of mind and labored slowness with the pen. Those who 17 cents. had not seen him for some time were most struck on meeting him within the last few months with the sudden whiteness of his white, just as Mr. Bright did not long since. I saw him a few weeks ago, just before he left town, and his sunburned face seemed set in snow, his beared and hair were bleached so perfectly. Beyond question, I think it was, Edwin Drood that killed him. went back to work too soon. He had had the idea of the story for some time in his mind, I believe ; but after the first inpulse of the start was off he found the development of the incidents and characters slow and painful. Within the last week or so he was planning much of this He seemed to make so little progress, and at the cost of such an event that perhaps it was the hot weather, he thought, or he was out of sorts, and would get into better trim by and by. But the disorder was deeper and more fatal. Even before hisillness last year, however, he had had warnings of exhaustion. He suffered at times from a terrible sleeplessness, which often drove him forth at midnight to walk-his favorite remedy for all troubles-till dawn. Like Wordsworth, he belonged to the school of peripatetics. Much given myself to walking at all hours, I have come across him in his rambles, always marching swiftly, with earnest, resolute air, as if bound to be at some given spot by the hour and and minute, his quick, glancing eye scanning everything and everybody In the story of the 'Two Apprentices, which he wrote with Wilkie Collins, he described his own restless, impetuous activity-laborious idleness he called it. All this wear and tear of writing, public readings and perpetual movement told even on his elastic and v.gorous constitution in the end. The American trip brought him close upon £30,000; but otherwise I'doubt whether it did him much good. Altogether, the strain was too severe.'

Fishing Among the Thousand

A gossipy correspondent of the Cincin nati Chronicle gives an entertaining sketch of the delights of fishing among Z the Thousand Islands of the St. Law rence .-The fishermen here have splendid boats

supply you with all the necessary tackle, and act as guides to the fishing grounds, as well guide you in and out of the labyrinths of Islands, which seem hopelessly complex to the stranger. The landlord at the hotel makes a speciality of fixing up nice lunches, and the oarsmen agree, before leaving the hotel, at what particular island, six or ten miles away, the party will meet at one o'clock. And to this point loaded with bass, pickerel and maskinonge, we tend about the appointed hour. The boatmen are experienced cooks, and soon the lunch is spread, the coffee oc boiling, and the odor of frying pickerel and broiling bass increase the already vigorous appetite. The style of fishing here is mostly by

trolling. The two poles are set, with lines each one hundred feet long. These you need not handle, except when the fish strikes them. The third line, of one hundred and twenty-five feet from the stern, you hold in the hand as you go sailing around rocks, cliffs, and through the shady little bays that every few minutes unexpectedly open up to the beholder. I have never had finer fishing, or more enjoyed the scenery, than upon the great St. Lawrence. I have been accustomed to call the Ohio and Mississippi rivers; but the St. Lawrence, ranging from eight to ten miles in which, and five to ten times the average depth of either-neither rising nor falling more than a few feet from one year's end to another -makes either of them sewers in com-

The water is beautifully clear, and at a depth of ten feet you can see the white rocks that mark a large portion of its bottom. It abounds in fish. Black bass, pickerel and maskinonge are kinds mostly captured by the hook. The maskinonge is thought to be of the finest flavour and most sought after by fishermenperhaps the more from the idea they are a gamier fish, and are more seldom caught than the others, and require more careful management after they are hooked to save them for your string.
