CANADA CENTRAL.—The track for the Canada Central R.R. is now being surveyed on Ashburnham Hill by Mr. R. Sparks.

MARSH.—The County Council meets on Monday next to take action in the matter of offering relief to the sufferers by the late fires.

QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY.—Yesterday a stone house on Mr. Baldwin's new piling grounds which if left standing would be an inconvenience was blown up by powder. An attempt was made to blow it up in the forenoon, but the blast was not large enough.

Ducks.—Ducks a couple of weeks ago were so plentiful along the Rideau and streams in the vicinity are now scarcely to be met with at all. They have been driven away by the numerous sportsmen or the geese or probably by both.

PASSOVER.—We are sure our readers will learn with pleasure that Lieut.-Col. Campbell so well and favorably known in connection with the 100th Royal Canadian Regiment has received his promotion to full colonelship in that Regiment.

FUNERAL.—The regular fair held in Ottawa on the first Wednesday in every second month will take place on Wednesday next. It will be unusually large owing to the number of horses and cattle which will be offered.

Funeral.—The funeral of Mr. Baldwin's son, and his wife, who died on the 2nd of August, will be held on Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the residence of Mr. Baldwin.

Runaway.—A runaway occurred yesterday on one of the back streets in Lower Town. A horse attached to a truck got frightened at a car which some women had been driving, and started off at a good pace, but was stopped by an active young man before he could do any damage.

QUEBEC.—There were over sixty

cars on the market yesterday for sale, the greater number of them being owned by farmers who have suffered by the late frost. Notwithstanding the great numbers which are offered for sale every day pretty prices are generally obtained. Yesterday from \$16 to \$25 was paid for them.

Market.—Thursday.—There was a very fair attendance on the market this morning. Potatoes and oats were plentiful, the former selling for 50 cents per bushel, and the latter for 55 cents per bushel. Eggs sold for the usual price, as did butter, of which there was little on the morning. Hay is selling from \$15 to \$17 per ton.

THEATRE AND ARREST.—On Wednesday last a Frenchman working on the Canada Central Railroad had \$27 stolen from him. The authorities were informed of the case, and yesterday a fellow workman of him from whom the money was taken was arrested for the theft. During the evening he strove hard to drive care away and make himself appear innocent by singing hideous songs.

Police Court, THURSDAY.—Delish Bush, was charged with keeping a house of ill-fame, and fined \$20 and costs, in default of which sum she was sent to gaol for three weeks.

Catherine Guinane was charged with throwing a stone at Wm. MacAdam. Catherine had a case in the County Court, yesterday, in which this same person was her opponent; but the case being decided against her, she resolved to obtain satisfaction in a summary way, and hence the throwing of the stone at Mr. MacAdam. She has still more satisfaction now to look forward, being fined \$1 and costs.

B. Beauchaine was fined \$2 and costs, for challenging to fight John Brown.

George Latourelle insulted the dignity of a meek Beauchaine, by presenting him with a similar proposition, but his wounded honor was not satisfied by the Magistrate, who dismissed the case.

His Majesty's THEATRE.—Last night the Indian drama, "Metamora," and the farce, "Rough Diamond" were played at the Theatre. As good an audience as on previous nights could not be expected, of course, on account of the rain, yet there was a fair number of ladies and gentlemen in the house. Mr. Byron played his part as the Indian Chief "Metamora" very successfully, evincing an ability to personate almost any character in the tragic drama. His elevation was appropriate and ably tempered, and he secured the eager attention of the audience throughout the play. Mr. Little, as usual, acted to perfection, and the others, who had minor parts, were very happy in playing. To-night is Mr. Little's benefit night, a good programme is prepared, and we expect to see a crowded house.

Manslaughter.

Time after time have we to record some instance of the pernicious effect of that bane and curse of mankind, liquor. But a few days ago we mentioned a case in which a man was sent to within an inch of his doom while in a drunken and shameful state; to-day we record an occurrence in which a man named Dubois received a fatal blow from a drunken antagonist, the unfortunate man himself being in a similar disgraceful state. Of the positive facts we are not informed, but it is certain they both were under the influence of liquor. As on every like occasion, several versions of the affair were afloat, and even at the scene of the occurrence, it was impossible to ascertain which was the correct one.

The true facts of the case will be obtainable only at the inquest. We shall, however, give in the meantime a couple of the most reliable versions, the first of which is to the following effect:—The two men, Thomas Crotty and one Dubois, were in the employ of Mr. Branton, mill owner, at the Chaudiere. Yesterday they were sent to pile laths on that gentleman's piling grounds. They took liquor with them, and drank freely during the day,

until they both became pretty ugly under its influence. Generally the laths are piled six feet in height, but Crotty, probably from the effects of the liquor, could or would throw them, only five tiers. Dubois reproached him for his inability to do the work of an ordinary man, and the former, retorting, they began to apply epithets to one another, till at length they came to blows, which resulted in Dubois receiving a fatal blow on the temple, or some say behind the ear. It is not known whether Crotty used any weapon in the shape of a stick or stone. According to his own account the fatal blow was struck with his left fist having struck with that one, he said because Dubois was watching his right hand too closely. The other version is that they had a fight in the morning, in which Crotty was worsted, and that in the afternoon whilst both were under the influence of liquor he resolved to have revenge and struck Dubois with a stick or a stone on the head killing him instantly. This is given as it was received with doubt, and it is meant to be read with a similar spirit. The former is the most probable, the most reliable and the most credible. However, Dubois received the fatal blow that deprived him of his existence, and it was all the result of the poisonous fluid liquor; one more of the many warnings to those who indulge as he and the man who struck him dead did, and we hope a warning which young beginners in the evil path will weigh and benefit by. Crotty is an Irishman. He is a big man, very strong and active. Dubois was, as we are told a pretty stout man, and as his name indicates, a Frenchman. An inquest will be held on the body at 8 o'clock this morning by Dr. VanCourtland, and probably Crotty will be tried at the Police Court.
