The fact is that the nations of continental Europe never do really disarm; they cannot trust one another sufficiently to allow of their doing so. This being the case, the which the Association will confer upon the surest guarantee for the peace of the world and navy in a thoroughly efficient condition. There is not perhaps any necessity for a material increase in the strength of the regular army, but what is required is a more thorough org ization of the reserve forces; the militis, yeomanry, volunteers, and armed pensioners. The fact that Great Britain is in a position to go to war if necessary, the knowledge and that she will not see treaties set at naught, would make continental nations very careful how they went to war. Which ever side Great Britain espoused would be almost certain to come out victorious, and this fact being known, she could often act the part of arbiter with authority and decision.
