EXHIBITION. The second annual exhibition of the city of Ottawa Agricultural Society opened yesterday on the Society's grounds, near the Swing bridge over the Rideau canal. The Exhibition will continue during Thursday and Friday; \$2,500 are offered in prizes, and competition is open to the world. Since last year many improvements have been made to the grounds, and the appearance of the whole is now certainly very creditable to the Society. The grounds are large, well situated, and everything in good order, with new buildings here erected for the exhibition of articles, and intended for exhibits, and many other improvements made, all tending towards perfecting the accommodations necessary. The bridge over the road is, however, probably the most important addition that has been made to the conveniences of the ground during the past year. The bridge is a good substantial structure, built over the road and connecting the grounds on either side. From about a mile this side of the grounds apple shops and refreshment saloons temporarily constructed extend the whole way to the grounds. They are so numerous that one would imagine preparations were being made for something of greater magnitude than that which is to take place. Refreshments of every kind can be had served up on application, and beverages from wine down to spruce beer are in abundant supply. The clerk who is generally some petteoned representative of the 18th century, attends to his customers with unfeigned ceremony, always kind and accommodating, while a few youngsters with a couple of cedar or balsam tops brush away in the intruding.
