A spark from a lumberer's pipe, or the kindling of a settler's fire, would be sufficient anywhere to cause a conflagration. But on Sunday the fires were still remote; no danger to the city vas apprehended. One fire, however, on the north side of the river seemed threatening. Vast masses of smoke from it rose arid against the heavens, casting their reection up n the river, and turning its cricket. waters to blood and gold. Three days pussed, and still but few of the inhabitants of the city felt any alarm. Then came a gight without example in the hist ry of Ittawa. On Wednesday; August 17, at sunset, a great wind arose, increasing midnight to a hurricane. All light of the sky was hidden, a horrid, most unnatural storm raged over Ottawa city and the great woods. The showers that fell were not of rain or hail but of dust and cinders and charred wood. The hot, stifling air was ifficult to breathe. In the straight streets swept by the gale a man could not stand upon his feet.
