Canada Central R. R.—The line of the Canada Central Railroad into the city has been finally surveyed, and already men are at work on it. It will pass under the brow of the hill directly below the residence of J. R. Lewis, Esq., and will continue from thence to the site of the proposed station along Biddy street, avoiding as much as possible interfering with houses. Much difficulty is experienced in running the line so as to avoid buildings, but we believe Mr. Sparks has been so successful in doing so that only one house will need to be moved.

Social Reasons.—Last evening the readings in the basement of the Congregational Church were well attended. The selections were choice, edifying and refining, reflecting credit on the good taste of the readers, some of whom are acknowledged to be the best elocutionists in the city. Police Court.—Thursday morning.—There was no case of a criminal nature on the police calendar this morning, but there were two parties summoned, one for using abusive language and the other for an alleged assault. Meeting of the School Trustees. The Mellifluous Collector on his Muscles. City Coupons Protested to the Amount of \$256. The Collector Calls one of the Trustees an "Infamous Liar" and a "Pup."

There was a rather stormy meeting of the Board of School Trustees in the City Hall last night. Eight coupons of \$25.00 each had been protested for non-payment, the City Chamberlain being, as it was alleged, without funds, when payment was demanded. Mr. Preston said that the Chamberlain to his certain knowledge had had \$400 of School moneys in his hands, and could have paid the coupons. Mr. LeSueur said that the question was not whether the Chamberlain had, at that moment, money in his hands for school purposes, but whether he had such money when the coupons were presented to him for payment. The chairman said his name had never been so "diagnosed" before.

Mr. Alexander said that it was matter of public notoriety that the coupons were to be dishonored. Mr. Preston said that he would put the blame where it ought to be. A "pup" who ought to be at home had told an "infamous lie," and had written about him to the newspapers; he and the Local Superintendent had tried to ruin his character, but he defied them. He had been brought up in Ottawa and would die in Ottawa. It was an infamous lie which had been circulated about him. He would teach the "pup" to speak ill of him. He ought not to be where he was. He had no business there, but ought to pay his taxes.


