YESTERDAY'S DESPATCHES.

New York, Nov. 16 .- The special correspondent of the Tribune, with Garibaldi, at DeCreuzot, says :- " 800 workmen came yesterday to Autun as a deputation to Garibaldi from La Creuzot, offering to place themselves and their whole establishment at his order to manufacture mitrailleuse, cannon and chassepots, or put on the red shirt and fight.
