They are to meet on the 24th instant at Ottawa, and the public will look anxiously for their report as to the works which ought to be undertaken with a view to advance the trade of our Dominion.

The works pressing on the attention of our people, and to which we learn the attention of the commission has been drawn with the view of obtaining information as to their respective costs, importance, comparative need of construction, &c., &c., are:

The enlargement of the Welland Canal. The deepening of the St. Lawrence Rapids. The deepening of the St. Lawrence River between Montreal and Quebec.

The improvement of the Rideau Canal, and the development of trade through it. The construction of the Saint St. Marie Canal between Lake Superior and Lake Huron.

The construction of a canal crossing the neck of land between the Bay of Quinte and Lake Ontario. The construction of the Bay Verte Canal across the isthmus dividing the Bay of Fundy from the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

A LONG STANDING DEBT. Few men have attained to a higher rank in the profession to which he belonged, than the late Joseph Bouchette, Esq., who was for many years Surveyor-General to the Crown, and to the Government of Lower Canada.

In the session of 1814 the propriety of having a general plan or map of the Province constructed, was discussed in committee, and Mr. Bouchette was applied to in relation thereto. He was asked whether the sum of £1,500 would defray the expense, to which he replied that if the Legislature would grant him £1,500 he would undertake the work.

The testimony of members of the Legislature prove conclusively that there was a decided understanding on the part of the members of the House that the one thousand pounds should be paid conformably with the resolution as soon as the work should be completed.
