GRAND PROMENADE CONCERT.—The readings, under the auspices of the St. Patrick's Literary Society, were opened last evening in the St. Patrick's Hall, by a promenade concert. In the absence of the President the chair was occupied by the Vice-President, Mr. Kelly, who opened the proceedings with a few remarks. He hoped the readings which they were inaugurating for the season would be as well patronized as they were last year. (The particular feature which characterized the readings of last season was that they were attended by persons irrespective of nationality or creed. He hoped it would be so this year. Dr. Sweetland, President of the St. George's Society, and Mr. May, President of the St. P. Society, occupied seats on the platform. The attendance was not very large, probably owing to the great attraction at the Music Hall, the music by Miss Smith was very good, receiving loud applause at each performance. Miss Bolan and Miss Tugson's singing was well appreciated and received loud encomiums. Messrs. Sutherland and Marrier's band performed its duty in its usual manner, and the reading by Mr. McCarthy was very interesting. The whole entertainment was up to expectations. During the season readings will be given every Wednesday evening in the St. Patrick's Hall.

THE WALLHALLA TROUPE.—The second performance of the Wallhalla Troupe attracted a crowded house last night, and as on the previous evening, gave unbounded satisfaction. Such terms as "a superb entertainment," "an elegant treat," "good in every sense of the word," are not often heard from an audience in admiration of a performance, but such were expressed on that night as were heard on every seat last night at the audience left the Music Hall. The gymnastic feats were neatly and skilfully executed. "Little Popo" again took the house by storm, and shared the honours very gracefully with his brother, who is little less expert than himself. Professor Schmidt is a clever performer and able director "Max" in his chair elicited enthusiastic applause, while the two clowns exhibited wonderful strength and agility. The tableaux were beautiful in arrangement and effect. A prettier sight than these tableaux has not been seen in Ottawa. The contortionist proved satisfactorily that he existed without bones and defied the rules that govern the movements of ordinary mortals. The prismatic fountain brought forth loud expressions of delight from the audience as they looked at its many changes of dazzling colours. It is a beautiful sight and particularly well managed by Prof. Schmidt. To-night there will be an entire change of programme and new and startling gymnastic feats are promised. Do not miss your chance to enjoy a treat should fall to witness this superior entertainment.

Indeed it is notorious that better French and Portuguese wines are procurable in America than in England, because the wine companies do not adulterate wines for American consumption, and because while the wine export duty—say on port, and correspondingly on other wines—costs 60 per pipe for exportation to America is only 60 per pipe. It is not too strong, nor is it sour as claret, it is not heavy, thick, and stringy as port, but it combines many of the properties of gold sherry with the brightness of the ruddy wine of France, which gives richness as it gives virtue even to Tokay.
