This Morning's Despatches. THE WAR.

LONDON, Nov. 18.—Thomas Carlyle writes two and a half columns in small type to the Times, on the subject of the war between France and Prussia. He shows that, in his own experience of four centuries, it is pretty sure to be hostile again, when she gets on her feet, and therefore prays the policy pursued by Prussia, which he claims is founded on solid and practical principles.

Advices have been received here from Orleans to the evening of last Monday. The Prussians had retired northwards, beyond Artzheim, and French troops had destroyed heavy earthworks in front of the railway junction outside of Amiens. A well informed correspondent writing from Vienna, says that if Russia fails for a revision of the Paris treaty of 1856, it should have been submitted to other sources, and a favorable result might have ensued.

Notwithstanding the momentary and somewhat forced unanimity existing in the cabinet upon the Russian question, it is known that this unanimity exists only in the theory that Russia will not proceed to enforce her claims, but that upon the Russian side, Italy and France resolve, and will submit the matter to arbitration, and not engage in any war. Should this expectation prove delusive, the peace party in the cabinet will resign, and abstain from all war measures.

AMERICAN NEWS. NEW YORK, Nov. 18.

It is published here that the English ambassador, Odo Russell, is only to obtain from Bismarck verbal statements in reference to the future attitude of Prussia in her alliance under the treaty of 1856, and that the fact of the communication of this treaty to Prussia will undoubtedly ally herself with Russia in a coming war.

News received from London, Vienna and Brussels, especially from the former city, that the English Government has not only refused to determine the measure both in official, consular and military departments, that she must, should the Russian circular not be withdrawn, inevitably precipitate war between Russia and England.

It is stated that when the Russian minister at Vienna communicated Gortschakoff's note to Baron Von Reut, he accompanied it with the assurance of a most respectful intention on the part of his government. The "Pall Mall Gazette," referring to Odo Russell's special mission to Versailles, believes the Under Secretary will return with a message of congratulation to the Emperor of Prussia, and that the treaty of 1856 will be signed.
