THE CENSUS OF 1871: The decennial numbering of the people has become a fixed system in nearly every civilized country.

It is interesting to note that the census of 1871 shows a population of 1,111,906 in the Province of Quebec, an increase of 250,000 since 1861.

There will be no danger of any portion of that ground, however small, being either left out or traversed more than once.

We are convinced, therefore, that the approaching census will, in every respect, be more accurate and complete than any taken before on this continent.

With regard to the political significance of the census about to be taken, we may state a few facts of considerable interest at the present time.

Assuming that the rate of increase has continued the same within the last ten years as it was between 1851 and 1861, then by calculation, Ontario in 1871 will show a population of 2,001,994.

Quebec, in 1871, had 1,111,906, the ratio of increase being 250,000 per cent. Nova Scotia, in 1861, had 330,857 people, and its increase was 182 per cent.

AMERICAN NEWS: WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—Secretary Fish yesterday that the recent news from Europe indicates that Russians are really earnest in their efforts to abrogate the provisions of the treaty of 1856.

He thinks it possible and quite probable that the result will be a peace congress of all the Great Powers of Europe, at which only the Eastern question, but possibly the Prussian and French war question may be settled.
