Latest by Telegraph.

London, Nov. 25.—The Times intimates this morning that Russia will be against closing the door to negotiations, an attitude which England will imitate.

The Times also says there are 200,000 Germans in the valley of the Loire. A party of Prussian dragoons on Wednesday entered St. Quentin for the purpose of stopping the railroad, but their attempt was defeated by the French.

The Prussian entrenched camp at Laon is nearly completed. The formal surrender of Thionville occurred this morning. The town had been burning since Tuesday last.

Mr. Owen Clifford who was tried at the last assizes at Kingston for being an accomplice in the arson committed by his son Francis Clifford, and sentenced two years to the penitentiary, died last Saturday in that institution.
