GOVERNMENT HOUSE, OTTAWA, 4th day of December, 1870.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR GENERAL IN COUNCIL.

On the recommendation of the Honorable the Minister of Land Revenue, and under and in virtue of the authority given by the 17th section of the Act 21st Vic., Chapter 8, intitled, "An Act respecting the Inland Revenue," His Excellency is hereby ordered that the following regulations for the manufacture of Methylated Spirit be observed:

REGULATIONS. 1st. The room in which the wood Naphtha is mixed with Spirit shall only be accessible to the proprietor during the actual presence of an Officer of the Inland Revenue.

2nd. A sample of the wood Naphtha (say about four ounces) shall be sent to the Department from every cask or package used.

3rd. Not less than 100 proof gallons of Alcohol shall be mixed at one time, which shall be mixed in an open mixing tub, in the presence of an officer who shall then test and gauge it as to strength and quantity.

4th. With every 100 proof gallons of Alcohol, there shall be mixed ten and a half gallons of "Wood Naphtha of Commerce," the whole being mixed together.

5th. After the mixing has been thoroughly completed, the strength of the mixture shall be tested, and the quantity gauged by the officer in attendance, and only recorded. The mixture shall then be placed in casks, the casks being branded or marked on the head in legible characters, with the words—

Methylated Spirit, Date on which it was mixed, Number of Wines gallons in the Cask. Strength, Number of Proof Gallons, Name of the Division.

6th. The initials of the officer under whose immediate supervision the mixture took place. Number of the entry under which it was recorded.

7th. A Stock Book must be kept in the Factory, in which Book must be entered— (a) The particulars of every package of Alcohol, brought in, stating where manufactured, strength and quantity; the marks, &c., on the casks, and the general number of the Permit, under which the same were manufactured.

(b) The particulars of every quantity mixed. (c) The original packages which were taken; the quantity and strength of the "Methylated Spirit" produced from it, and the particulars as to marks, numbers, &c., of the Cask in which it is placed.

8th. So soon as the mixing and Bravouring has been completed, the "Methylated Spirit" shall be removed from the Bravouring, and immediately delivered for warehousing as required by the regulations in that behalf.

CUSTOMS DEPARTMENT. OTTAWA, 3rd Nov., 1870. To COLLECTORS OF CUSTOMS. "SLATE"—SCHEDULE C—FREE GOODS.

With reference to the item of the Tariff, it is held by the Board that SLATE is a quadrangular form, whatever may be its size or thickness is entitled to exemption. If otherwise, especially when of 11 1/2 inches, or less in length, it becomes subject to 15 per cent and 6 per cent duty, as a non-enumerated article.
