MEETING.

An assembly of the citizens of all nationalities in the city of Ottawa, was held in the hall of the French Canadian Institute, on the 13th of January, 1871, for the purpose of relieving the French widows, orphans and wounded, left in destitution by the war now raging.

Mr. Turgot having been called to the chair, explained in both languages the object of the assembly, after which were proposed and unanimously carried the resolutions:

Moved by S. Drapau, President of the French Canadian Institute, that this meeting, with the signatures of all origin in this country, be sent to the present body politic in France who would express its most sympathy for the unhappy families, afflicted by the disastrous war in that country, in order to alleviate the misery of their condition, and to add a mite to the relief of the widows and orphans.—Carried.

Moved by the Honorable James Sked, seconded by Doctor Beauchamp, that this meeting, with the signatures of all origin in this country, be sent to the one government of the two countries of Canada, and offers to the widows and orphans of France that share of assistance, which benevolence ever calls from the friends of humanity.—Carried unanimously.

Moved by Mr. John Clancy, seconded by Dr. St. Jean, that in order to give effect to the foregoing motion, it is resolved that a Committee of a certain number of persons be formed to collect the contributions

of our citizens, and that the persons thus chosen do form, with the office to carry out its purposes.—Adopted unanimously.

Moved by W. Mackay Wright, Esq., seconded by M. Leduc, N. P., that a subscription list be now opened, and lists for the several streets of the city, and for actioning persons to be distributed among the persons to be named at the present meeting, arrived.

Moved by Mr. N. Germains, seconded by Mr. John Kelly, that the Hon. James Sked, J. M. Currier, M.P., Mr. Grant, Almon Wright, and the members of the neighbouring constituencies, be the president of this assembly be charged of collecting the subscriptions of His Excellency the Governor-General and the Ministers of the Federal Government, and that all the collected sums be published in the papers of this city in the ordinary manner.

Moved by W. Mackay Wright, Esq., seconded by Chas. Skead, Senator, we, on behalf of the Queen's Bank, be named Treasurer of the collected subscriptions, and that to the Secretary of this meeting be entrusted the care of sending the total amount to the French Consul in Quebec, with a letter of sympathy, in the name of the subscribers.—Carried.
