ST. WHITMORE AND CLARK'S MINSTRELS.—This troupe of minstrels gave an entertainment last evening in the Rink Music Hall to a large audience, notwithstanding that the cold kept away a great many who otherwise would have attended. The Hall was uncomfortably cold, though timely steps will be taken against a similar state of things to day. With regard to the performances, they were generally a very good sample of their kind, while parlor pieces were excellent, as was shown by the applause of the audience.
