MORALITY.—The total number of deaths during the past week from small-pox was eleven.

CITY COUNCIL.—The new Council meets to-night when the election of Mayor will take place.

WEATHER.—About 4 p. m. on Saturday, the weather suddenly changed from soft and fine to cold. A sharp wind commenced to blow from the east.

APPOINTMENT.—We are glad to learn that Mr. E. Armstrong who went with the last expedition to Red River has been appointed Sheriff of the Province of Manitoba.

FUNERAL.—The funeral of Mr. Archd. McDougall took place on Saturday morning. His remains were followed to the grave by a large number of persons.

VOYE OF THANKS.—At the regular meeting of the Ottawa Typographical Union, held on the 6th inst., a vote of thanks was passed to the master printers of Ottawa, for the liberal manner in which they acceded to the demand of the printers.

THE MARKET.—Saturday's market was small. Beef sold at the following quotations: Best at \$5 50 to \$6 25; Ox at 40 cts. per bushel; hay, wood, 10 to 14 cts.; wool hard \$4 to \$5; wool, soft \$3 to \$4.

THE MAYORALTY.

We are not ignorant of the fact that the vacant mayoralty has been the cause of considerable agitation and numerous little schemes among the members of the City Council. We also are aware that the vacillations and irresolution of the members is such that no definite and general decision has been arrived at. This should not be; every alderman should know his duty with respect to the mayoralty. Last year, we gave our reasons for advocating the election of a member of the Council of French nationality, to the position of Chief Magistrate of the city, and we have no doubt that the force of our arguments were duly realized though certain prejudices probably served to counteract their effects.

Fully one third of the population of Ottawa is composed of French (Canadian), and therefore we look upon it as but simple justice that one of our municipal representatives should at proper intervals of time occupy the position of Mayor. Our French fellow citizens are an intelligent, industrious, and influential portion of the community; they are extensive owners of property, and have heavy interests, commercial and otherwise, in the city. Their rights should not be ignored nor their feelings injured. They have shown themselves liberal all along in all public meetings or transactions with the English speaking portion of the population, and what they now ask is simply a reciprocation of that liberality. It is not the honor or importance of the position that should be looked to, but the preservation of good feeling among all classes of the population. We consider Ald. Martineau as being in every way well qualified to perform the duties of Chief Magistrate. We advocate his election to that position this year, on the same grounds that we did last year. Of the French citizens he is a representative man, and in his commercial transactions he has proved himself to be honest and able. Several years of conscientious hard work in the City Council have proved him deserving of public confidence, and certainly of public gratitude. He is possessed of good abilities and a sound judgment, and has ever manifested a progressive disposition in all matters of public interest.

We feel satisfied that he would fill the position with credit to the city as well as to himself, and hope to see him elected.

CONGREGATION DE NOTRE DAME.

We always record with pleasure the celebration of any festival, but particularly so when youthful innocent hearts take part in the occasion.

Friday last was a gala day at the Congregation de Notre Dame, being the hundred and seventy-second anniversary of Margaret Bourgeois, the venerable foundress of the above named far-famed Institution.

His Lordship the Bishop of Ottawa after celebrating mass in the Chapel, where he was welcomed by the pupils with that ease and grace, which accomplishment they so quickly acquire under the instructions of their lady teachers.

After a brilliant display of musical abilities by the young ladies, His Lordship was presented with an address to which he replied in his usual pleasing manner.

He assured the pupils that though ever happy to visit them, his being among them on that occasion afforded him an unusual degree of pleasure, as the festival which they were celebrating was one which should be dear, not only to them, but to all Canada. The venerable lady whose anniversary they were celebrating was a benefactress of the New World, the institution which she founded over a century ago having prospered and branched out over the whole continent of America, refining and educating the youth everywhere. It is difficult to realize at the present day, when Canada enjoys so high a degree of prosperity, and when its inhabitants are surrounded by every com-

fort and convenience of advanced civilization, how much the illustrious lady had to endure during the many years which she passed in the forests of Canada, in her long and weary journeys, which frequently lasted for several months, and in the midst of the poverty and misery which its woods and wilds presented over a century ago. Now that civilization has succeeded barbarism, and the sweet light of faith to the darkness of infidelity, giving to the inhabitants of this country the anticipations of a brilliant future. Her work of love and devotedness is continued by her daughter, worthy imitators of their sainted founder, Mother Bourgeois.

The following address composed by Miss Armstrong, one of the graduating pupils, certainly does credit to the head and heart of the young lady: "Full all the sorrows of this weary earth. Full many a joy still sweetly finds its birth. 'Till all the thorns that e'er impede our way. Bright perfume'd flowers deck life's capricious day. One of these joys we hail at this fair hour, New brightly bloometh such a cheering flower."

STAY IN A FRENCHMAN.—The Rev. A FRENCH FURY.

The Paris correspondent of the London Standard gives an account of the trial and condemnation of Louis Michel, a remarkable woman in her way. She commenced her career of wrong doing by becoming an ardent disciple of the sensational doctrine called "woman's rights."

The following are the salient points in the case of an assassin: "It was in 1870, at the time of the death of Victor Noir, that Louis Michel began to put forth her revolutionary ideas. An obscure teacher, but with very few pupils, it has been impossible for us to discover what was her mode of life at the time, or what were the means she took in the event which has placed her in the front of the monstrous outrage which subsequently terrified our unfortunate country. It is, however, generally supposed that she is either a member or an active agent of the International Association, which, as is known, organized all the acts of violence on our day ever known in the history of the world. On the 15th of March she married a man, a National Guardsman, proclaimed to the Rue de Valenciennes at Montmartre, and saw the committee assembled there. What took place in that house on that day, we know in any case she was a party to the arrest of General Clement Thomas and Lecontepele was very anxious they should not escape their fate, and what about shooting? 'Whatever you do, don't release them.' After the murders she expressed her joy at the bloodshed that had taken place, she went back to her home, and apparently felt a desire to talk over what had taken place with her confidante, she told him 'Ah! Clémentine, the Mayor of Montmartre had arrived a few moments since in the Rue de Valenciennes, the general would not have been shot, as a Versailles man would have opposed it.' Louis Michel said that she had been a party to the arrest of General Clement Thomas and Lecontepele was very anxious they should not escape their fate, and what about shooting?
