If all large rivers flowed as some do, on ne even incline, their waters would present only a smooth current; this to the cance or the sailing vessel would offer simply the advantage of easy descent with one difficulty in going up, but with our present steam power we scarcely notice currents, for or against our course. they exceed in velocity the speed of the vessel, and when amounting only to one half or one third of the ship's usual rate

All rivers, however, are not graded by but descend in places more rapidly, while for long stretches they are alm at level such is the case with both the St. Lawrence and the Ottawa. To grade these large rivers anew would be a gigantic task, but by no means difficult to make an imitation of a river alongside that should flow smoothly, and be large enough for navigation. This artificial river alongside need not extend the whole oistance but be con structed or excavated only for such lengths as would be necessary to pass by the rapids.
