SIR JOHN MACDONALD AND THE TREATY.

When we come to consider the nature leaders say that Sir John Macdonold as a Senator of the Dominion, which we ought to have assumed as a the Joint High Commission, we cannot fail to be struck with its absurdity. They contend that he ought to have insisted beforehand that his views and wishes should be acted upon, so far at all events as Canadian affairs were concerned. Supposing every member of the Commission when appointed by the Colonial Secretary had taken a similar course, had made it a sine qua non that their wishes on certain points should be carried out at all hazards, what sort of a Commission would it have been? The Imperial Commissioners, one and ail, were sent to Washington for the purpose of representing the views and carrying out the policy of the Imperial Government. Sir John Macdonald did not sit upon that Commission in his capa. Premier of Canada, but as a statesman in whose ability Her Majesty had confidence, who as a Canadian understood the merits of those questions in which the people of this country are interested. His appointment was a compliment to Canada. The Imperial Government were not bound to appoint a Canadian on the Commission. It was also a compliment to Sir John Macdonald, although we should not imagine it was one which he particularly cared to have paid him. Having once been offered the appointment, however, it became his duty to accept it, and accept it he did. Had he been a selfish politician, like the man who is constantly abusing him and misrepresenting his actions, had he thought only of making his own political course smooth and easy, he might very probably have ignored his duty to Canada and the Empire, and refused the appointment. Knowing that his political foes would be ready and eager everything he in that capacity, he would have declined the proffered honour. 
