IMPORTANT TO TEACHERS.—The examination of Teachers, or the awarding of certificates, will be held in the various places appointed throughout the Province of Ontario, as follows:—For Second and Third class certificates, on Tuesday the 16th day of July next; for first-class provincial certificates, on Tuesday the 23rd day of July. All those interested had better see to it, that they are prepared to sit an appearance before the different Boards of Examiners as they need not expect to be indulged with such leniency, as they have been during the first year of the inception of the new school Act of 1871.

DEPREDATIONS AT ASHTON.

About half past nine o'clock on Thursday night, as the Canada Central train for Ottawa was a short distance this side of Ashton station, a stone weighing about two pounds was hurled through the window into the passenger car. It was thrown with such force that it broke through the blinds, plate-glass and ash, passing close to Mr. Orme's head and grazing the face of a clergyman. On the same night several young men took possession of the station and breaking open a barrel of beer drunk all they could. A young girl was the only person in charge of the station at the time.

The matter was immediately placed in the hands of Detective O'Neil who requested the p.s. to keep silent for a few moments while the facts were ascertained. On Saturday morning when the police-principals were gathered to consider what course of action to take, Detective O'Neil thought the law was not going to trouble them, Detective O'Neil proceeded to Ashton accompanied by Sergeant McVeety and County Constable. In a short time they had arrested eight young men, four of whom they were afterwards released. They brought to Ottawa, Mr. Reilly, James, John Kelly and Francis Schreiter. Their trial is due on Monday next.
