St. L. & O. R. R.—Several members of Parliament, besides an extraordinary large number of general passengers, left to-day last evening by the St. L. & O. R. R. The amount of baggage was of course also very large, but notwithstanding this rush of business it was pleasing and satisfactory to witness the harmonious expedition with which the officials, under the direction of the intelligent superintendent, Mr. Luttrell, performed their duty. No delay, no mishap, and the train crowded with passengers left punctually according to table time.

It is understood Mr. Currier will offer himself, and we hear it creditably stated that Dr. O'Connor, Esq., will also be a candidate. Mr. O'Connor is well known to the public as a man of able and upright character. He has grown up with the place, being a native of the city, and for many years past has occupied himself with his profession. Mr. O'Connor will give his support to the present Government.

OTTAWA TURF CLUB RACES.—As announced in advertisement and posters, the Ottawa Turf Club Races will take place over the Club course, Bank street road, on May 31st and June 1st. Purse to the amount of \$2,500, independent of the Queen's Plate will be run for and we are informed that several horses of good fame will enter the competition. Among the foreign horses already in Ottawa are Terror, Bay Jack, Charley Douglas, Manly and Bay Boston. These are all horses of good mettle.

All entries must be made before 9 o'clock on Wednesday evening next.

Among the rules and regulations are the following: Three horses to be entered or no race. The decision of the Judges, in all cases, to be final.

All jockeys to be dressed in correct jockey costume.

Races to commence at 2 o'clock.

Third money will only be given when four or more horses start.

Turf Club weights, 3 years old, 90 lbs.; 4 years, 104 lbs.; 5 years, 112 lbs.; and aged, 118 lbs. In all cases weight for age races, Do-inion bred horses allowed 7 lbs. Mares and geldings allowed 3 lbs. Weight for age is two stone added to weight for age.

THE WIMBLEDON TEAM.—A circular has been issued by the Dominion Rifle Association, from which we glean the following information.

In the first place owing to the comparatively limited extent of time available for the selection of a team for Wimbledon, it becomes necessary to adopt a more expeditious mode than hitherto.

In consequence, it is decided to postpone the Annual Match of this Association, proposed to be held at Ottawa on the 17th of June, until the return to Canada of the Wimbledon Team—the date at which it is to be held to be subsequently determined by the Executive Committee, by whom due notice will be issued.

The following are the most important clauses in the Resolution as altered to provide for the selection of the Team:—1st. The firing upon which the selection is to be made may take place at the ranges of the respective Provincial Associations during any three days in the week commencing on Monday, 21st inst. under the supervision of such persons as may be appointed by the Adjutant General.

2nd. Thirty rounds shall be fired on each of the three days—namely, five rounds in the morning, and five rounds in the afternoon, at each of the ranges, 200 yards, 300 yards, and 600 yards. At 200 yards from the shoulder, and at the other ranges from any position.

3rd. Each Provincial Association shall send to the Secretary of the Dominion Rifle Association, on or before the 6th June, the full details of the scores made in the 90 rounds by the men from whom they desire the final selection to be made, namely, ten from each Province.

4th. From the forty scores so submitted the Executive Committee will select twenty to proceed to Wimbledon, and as soon as the selection has been made the names will be telegraphed to the Secretaries of the respective Provincial Associations.

5th. The expenses of the men to Quebec must be paid by the respective Associations, and their expenses from the time at which they report at Quebec, and while on duty until they return to their homes, will be paid by the Dominion Association.

We must here reiterate the complaint, so generally made respecting the injustice and unreasonable nature of the regulation which renders eligible for Wimbledon only such volunteers as have won a silver medal or a first or second class prize. This regulation is manifestly unjust and unfair, to the great body of volunteers, many of whom may be improved, since the last match as to afford them fair hopes in the race for Wimbledon were they permitted to enter the competition. It is hoped the regulation will be abrogated immediately.
