ACCIDENT ON THE GRAND TRUNK.

NAPLES, June 22.—The Express train due here last night at 12:30, while running between Shannonville and Tyendagoc was thrown from the track by a defective rail, and between five and eight killed, and a great number seriously injured.

Nine are dead, and about forty badly wounded, many of them fatally. The wounded are all in the freight shed, and all the medical men here are in attendance.
