The latest account of the burning of the palace and monastery of the Escurial states that the corps of engineers from Ma. drid arrived in time to be of effective service. They managed to confine the fire to the part it had attacked, and saved a considerable portion of the building. Many valuable books had been removed, and it is hoped that the whole of the library will be saved, but with a portion of the books and manuscripts in a damaged condition.

A Conservative member of the English Parliament, the Right Hon. Sir Charles Adderley, who was under-Secretary of State in the last Disraeli Administration, made a speech on Wednesday night, at Burslem, in which he fully endorsed the result of the Geneva Arbitration, and said that the world's prosperity depended upon a cordial understanding between England and America.
