This trial is to ex tend over six hours, at the end of which the commanding officer will return to the port and make a report on the trial stating whether there are any defects in the engines which cannot be made good without assistance from the dockyard. It there are no such defects in the engine . and the trial is considered in every way satisfactory, the ship may at once proceed on the service for which she is to be employed.
