There was a meeting of the Privy Council yesterday afternoon, and meetings will probably be held daily for some time.

We understand that the Hon. Alex. Morris has resigned the Chief Justiceship of Manitoba, and has been appointed...

The North West Council has not yet formally appointed, but the names of the prospective members are supposed to be pretty well known in official circles.

It is probable that these appointments will be made in a few days; and in the meantime as one Judge has already left for Fort Garry and another leaves on the 15th inst. the existing delays in the administration of justice will be speedily removed.

We are glad to be able to announce that Mr. Samuel Hume Blake, Barrister-at-Law, has been appointed Vice-Chancellor in the Ontario Court of Chancery, to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of the Hon. Mr. H. H. Blair.

Another legal appointment has been made; that of Mr. Isaac F. Toms, of Goderich, to be Junior Judge of the County of Huron. This appointment has been rendered necessary by the vast extension of the County, and its rapid increase in population.

The Quebec Government, we perceive by the Budget Speech, intend to augment the salaries of all the employees after the 1st of January next, and in the meanwhile to grant them a bonus, equal in amount to a month's pay.
