THE THIRTY-THIRD ANNUAL MEETING

Was held in the Board Room of the Association's Offices, at Elinburgh on Tuesday, the 29th October, 1872, Sir Archib del Hope, Bert, in the chair. The following is the substance of the Directors' Report and statement submitted : -During the year ending 5th April, 1872-

New Life Assurances were proposed to the number of 2 397, for £ 34,667 Stg. of which were accepted 1 889, for 832 181 (These New Transactions are upwards of £180,000 more than these of the previous year.) Cash Bonuses were paid to the Policy hollers to the amount of£1,070,247 Stg. (This amount is £16,297 greater than the Revenue of the previous year.)

231 Deaths occurred among the assured, under 289 policies for. 123,930 (According to the mortality tables, 326 policies should have fallen by Death.) 47 New Life Annuities, for £4.725 per annum, was granted, and 12 Annuities, for £457 per annum, fell by the death of the Annuitants.

At the end of the year-18.445 Policies of Assurance were in force, for£7,684,972 The Total Claims paid under policies by the Association were. . . . 1,464,717 " The Total Cash Bonuses paid or allotted to Policy-holders were..... The Assets of the Association at 5th April, 1872, as per the Balance-

(This is an Increase of £413,386 over the previous year) Cash Bonuses were declared at the same rates as last year-namely-from 37 per cent to 25 per cent on the whole life tabular premium—to the participating policy holders in Class A. who have paid at least six years' premiums; the Bonuses to be applied in part payment of the Current years' premiums and subject to the survivance of the lives. All policies opened in the year ending 5th April, 1867, thus be ome entitled for the first time to a Cash Bonus at the rate of 25 per cent. These Bonuses are estimated to amount to £39,278 16s ld.

A Dividend to the Shareholders was declared, at the same rate as for the previous year, - namely 11 per cent on the Paid-up Capital, and payable on the 11th November proximo, under deduction of the portion paid on 15th May last. The Directors tendered their sincere thanks to the members of the Boards at the several Branches, with all of whom they worked in full harmony, and especially to the Directors at London and Montreal, where an important part of the business is transacted, and specially thanked all their agents and correspondents, to whose co opera tion they feel greatly indebted.

"I am generally content at our Annual Meetings to make but few remarks in submitting to you the Directors Report and Statements of Account. -" A third of a century, however, has now rolled over the Association-a whole generation of men, in fact, have come and gone since its commencement—and al though I still find myself without anything of a novel character to comment upon, yet as o ir new transactions of last year have far exceeded thoselof any previous period, I thought it would not be unbecoming in me to draw your special attention to that

In moving the adoption of the report, the Chairman addressed the meeting as

circum-tance, and place before you a few figures from our Books, showing very strik ingly, as I think, the rate and quality of our progression. " As regards the amount of our new Life Assurances for the year, £880,000, we are fairly entitled to take the full credit of it, for we have had none of the large policies which now and then occur in all Life Offices, and the most of which has to be given off privately to other companies, that is, 're-assured,' as it is technically termed.
