THE WELLAND CANAL

The Toronto Mail, which is supposed to be very favorably disposed towards the Dominion Government, and the Toronto Globe, which is not suspected of any such leaning, have both been making a mess of it in regard to the Welland Canal improvements. The Mail of the 28th ult. spoke as if the Government had already decided upon the route of the new portion to be built, and the Globe of the 31st represents that a "powerful ring" to fayour the Thorold route has been formed, and is composed of some local men, and one or two wealthy Ottawa Government officials."
