

LETTERS BY TELEGRAPH.

FROM MONTREAL. (Special to the Times)

Montreal, March 6, 1873. General satisfaction is expressed here today at the appointment of Hon. Mr. Cookburn to the office of Minister of the Interior.

The quarterly meeting of the new City Council commences on Monday. Weather cold. Harry Peck's, of the Holman Opera Troupe, took a benefit to-night and had the largest audience ever inside of the Theatre Royal.

A telegram from New York says that the first number of the Daily Graphic had a sale of 30,000 copies.

Stock exchange, but firm. The Bank of Montreal sold at 12 1/2, closed for 12 1/2; by buyers, 12 1/2; Ontario, 11 1/2; City 59; Merchants' 11 1/2; 11 1/2; Commercial, 12 1/2 to 12 1/2; Graphic 11 1/2 to 12, closing at 11 1/2 to 12.

Five active and unchanged prices; receipts 500 barrels; 22,000 barrels, at \$6 40 to \$6 50 for sugar; 10 to 12 for strong hams; 5 to 5 5/8 for ordinary Canada hams; 5 7/8 to 5 8/8 for No. 2.

MIDNIGHT DESPATCHES. (By Montreal Line.)

CABLE NEWS. GREAT BRITAIN. London, March 6.—Advices from Gibraltar state that two thousand Carlists attacked the Spanish garrison at San Roque, seven miles northwest of Gibraltar, and attempted to create a rising in favor of Don Carlos.

It is rumored that the Marquis of Lorne and the Princess Louise have separated, because of incompatibility of temper, that the Princess is in the United States, and the Marquis is in London.

President Thiers has recognized the legitimate rights of the Carlists in Spain. The impression grows in London that Don Carlos will succeed.

It is rumored that the Carlists leader intend to raise a loan. A Madrid despatch states there is intense excitement there and that a conflict is expected between the government and the Carlists.

The Government buildings are guarded and troops are stationed at various points. It is stated in the Cortes refuses to dissolve the entire Cabinet and President Figueras will resign.

London March 6.—A despatch from Berlin to the London Times says:—Many thousand officers and soldiers left Berlin for Petersburg for Asia and it is probable that the Khivir campaign will commence at an early day.

The Spanish Government concluded to contract no new loans at present. At the testimonial banquet given last night by Peter John Locke King, M.P., and other members of the House of Commons, the speech delivered by Gladstone is the occasion of much comment.

The Irish Education bill, and intimated that the Government would gladly accept all available amendments, and would even consent to modifications which would not better the bill, in order to avoid the adoption of any reserve measure.

In conclusion, the speaker said that when the hour for the dissolution of the ministry arrived he was ready to retire, but he would not needlessly abandon our posts.

At a meeting of the Royal Institution of Great Britain on Tuesday night, resolutions were adopted congratulating Prof. Tyndall on the success of his visit to the United States, and expressing satisfaction that America had been enabled to share with England the advantage of scientific instruction.

GERMANY. Berlin, 6.—The Naturalization Treaty between Germany and the United States will probably be amended so as to provide that Germans who returned from America and remained seven years at home should be considered to have renounced their rights as naturalized citizens.

New Orleans, March 6.—A collision between the police and militia, yesterday, resulted in the killing of one man and wounding seven. Great excitement prevailed and the militia and police are on guard.

A large number of people this morning visited the scene of the affray. Lost sight of the effect of the fire of the canister was in the air, or three places. Several iron columns of the building were perforated, and one was knocked down and broken in splinters.

The railing of Jackson square is also broken in several places, and have and the trees in the square are also clipped. The bullets and the ground strewn with broken branches. This gives only a faint idea of the severity and briskness of the fire.

About 500 citizens or militia who participated in last night's affray were arrested, charged with violating the act of Congress passed April 23rd, 1871.

The city is very quiet this evening, and it is believed no further demonstrations will be made while the United States troops remain in charge.

New York, March 6.—Arrived, steamship "Albatross," from Cape Cod, with 100 passengers.

A Havana despatch says that the Captain General has ordered that the reporter of an American newspaper, now in the camp of the Insurreccion, be sent out of the country, if he returns to the Spanish Islands.

San Francisco, March 6.—Steamship "Great Republic," arrived here, bringing in the disabled steamer "Idaho." The crew and passengers are well.

New York, March 6.—The steamer "Frisco," from Hamburg, has been purchased the Grand Central Hotel, and will open it on the 1st of June.

An official document was received from Governor Dix to-day, and the Sheriff's guard has been removed from the prisoners' cell.

Coming, N. Y. C.—A fire in the premises of business, together with the Eagle Hotel, which occupied nearly the entire business portion, was destroyed. Many buildings were consumed before the fire was checked, but no one was injured.

VICTIM'S DISPATCHES.

Washington, March 6.—The President will now have to appoint members of the Fish Commission on the part of the United States, and, if reasonable expenditure is used, our fishermen can enjoy during the coming season the privilege of fishing in Canadian waters without being harassed by the Dominion navy.

We shall also have free trade in fish, which will deprive the fishery of \$150,000, now paid in duties on fish, and cod, which will cheapen those popular articles of diet.

The following despatch was read from Governor Kinnear:—An armed mob of several hundred attacked the Third police station and court building, on the 1st inst., and, after a short repulse the mob, driving them off, is reported that several are killed and wounded.

General Rodger, with a force, came upon their rear, capturing and dispersing a large number. The police stations are filling up with prisoners. A company of troops came up just as the mob were driven off. They are scattering to their homes. The mob were directed to disperse before any firing. The attack was commenced by them.

Paris, March 6.—The report was current last evening that Thiers was seriously ill, but it proved to be untrue. The President is only slightly indisposed and it is announced this morning that he has recovered.

Washington, March 6.—Probabilities—For the rest of Thursday over New England and the Lower Lakes and southward to Virginia, falling barometer, rising temperature, northerly winds and clear weather by Thursday night.

Madrid, March 6.—Senor Vossage, the Spanish Minister to France, has notified Senor Castelar, Minister of Foreign Affairs, by telegraph, that the representatives in Paris of the different powers of Europe have decided to send a collective note to the Government of Spain declaring their belief that their respective governments will cease to hold diplomatic relations with it in the event of the proclamation of a Federal Republic.

The debate upon the bill for the abolition of slavery in Porto Rico was resumed yesterday in the assembly.

The change in value in 1872 is nearly 60 per cent.
