Customs Receipts—A Man Missing
Supposed For Play—The Roman
Investigation—Fashionable Wed-

MONTRÉAL, June 4.—The customs receipts today were \$18,426.

Two seamen deserted yesterday from the steamer "Solano," but were caught and reapprehended.

Rev. Mr. Chapman, of Zion Church is about to leave for England to spend the summer with his relatives.

A man named Pierre Labelle, captain of a large, disappeared on Friday night and has not since been heard of. His wife fears that he has been murdered, as he had money in his possession at the time.

In the Roman investigation to-day, Mr. Kerr addressed the court on behalf of the Captain and officers, giving a resume of the evidence, and concluding with the suggestion that the captain has no certain knowledge of the man's fate, and suggesting the advisability of memorializing the Government at the earliest opportunity of direct supervision over capital punishment of the rapists, so that in any case of a judgment of guilty or violation of the law they might be punished.

At the close of Mr. Kerr's argument the court returned, and in a short time decided on the verdict, which will be made public and the sentence pronounced on Friday.

At a meeting of the International Typographical Union this morning a large number of appeals, resolutions, communiques, &c., were read by the Secretary.

Among them was a alleged grievance of the employees of the Post Office and all advised to set his own type, because he was working in his own office, compared with the Committee on Subsidiary Unions. Among the resolutions passed, one recommended that the Legislature of the Province of the United States be petitioned to enact a law providing that all debts, mortgages, contracts and other papers, and also the journal records, minutes of proceedings and judgments of the principal courts, be printed instead of writing, as it could be done much cheaper by printing, and more copies could be distributed, thus preventing the damage which often occurs by the destruction of copy by fire or otherwise, and rendering necessary the expense for searching and recovering copies.

Proprietary Burned—Attempted Bur-
glary.

HAMILTON, June 4.—About eleven o'clock last night the proprietor "City of Chatham," loading at the Great Western Railway Company's dock, was discovered to be on fire. The flames spread rapidly all over the vessel. The Great Western steam gang sounded the alarm and all the men under stem kept up an unearthly screech which thoroughly alarmed the whole city and brought thoughts to the scene of the conflagration. The crew, who were on board, but nothing was saved. A doctor on board said the disease prevails now, but there is little excitement in regard to it.

The Bank of England Forgery—Writ of habeas corpus refused—The Extradition Completed—Macdonald Sails for England.

Judge Devine has dismissed the writ of habeas corpus issued by Judge Faucher in the case of Macdonald, the English forger.

Of the one hundred thousand pounds obtained through the forgeries on the Bank of England, it is alleged by Macdonald and his assistants, all but twenty thousand pounds have been recovered.

Macdonald was taken from Fort Columbus to the SS. "Minnesota," which sailed at noon today. He is in charge of two London police officers.

Alied Murderer Committed for Ex-
tradition.

Carl Vogt, an alleged Belgian murderer, has been committed to Fort Columbus pending the argument of a writ of certiorari.

A Washington special says: There is a very strong sentiment here, in and out of official circles, in favor of Capt. Jack and his confederates, in the assassination of General Canby and of sparing the lives of the others.

Four Hundred and Fifty Miles of the Northern Pacific Completed.

St Paul, Minn., June 4.—The following telegraph was received from Rockwood, Dakota, June 4.—The track of the Northern Pacific Railway has reached Missouri River at this place to-day, and the entire distance of four hundred and fifty miles, from Duluth to Eau Claire, is open to business. The people are celebrating the event. Connection is now here with the navigation of the Upper and Lower Mississippi. A line of steamers is established between this fort and Fort Benton in West Montana, and both of government and private freight are being made by this route to the North-West.

The railway surveying expedition with a military escort under Col. Stanley started from St Paul on May 16, with the intention of marking the final location of the road from the crossing of the Missouri to the crossing of the Yellowstone, and along that river to Central Montana, being the only portion of the route not yet determined. No serious opposition from the Indians is anticipated by those best able to judge.

Indians in Memphis.

Memphis, June 4.—A man, who had been ill for a few days, died yesterday, when the physicians generally agreed that it was Asiatic cholera. So far its ravages have been chiefly confined to the negroes and labouring classes, and in the absence of a Board of Health, it is difficult to estimate the number of fatal cases. The doctors say that the disease has promptly attended to, yields readily to treatment. Among the latest victims was Geo. Mason, of the Memphis and Louisville Transfer Company, who died last night.

Reports from the Towns on the river below here, say that the disease prevails there also. There is but little excitement in regard to it.

San Francisco, June 4.—The following dispatch has been received:—

BOYCE CAMP, TULIKE, PENNSAUGAN, June 2.—After writing my report of yesterday, I found that the captives and captors remained at Applegate ranch. Before night, Captain Jack, the murderer of General Canby and Commissioneer McEachern, were ironed together and placed with other warriors in a small building adjoining Applegate's house, under a guard. Neither Captain Jack nor Schenck spoke a word. Not a muscle of Captain Jack's face moved. The usual Sunday evening service of the Warm Springs were dispersed with. Instead a glorious dance was held till midnight. They danced and howled about the fire and indulged in other demonstrations of frantic delight. All the military force of the expedition united. The cord of General Macdonald was broken.

The question now is what will be done with the Modocs. To-morrow we will go in search for the last of them.

GREAT BRITAIN.

An unfounded statement—The new Bank Act condemned—The Shah of Persia's visit—Statutes to Earl Derby and Sir Robert Peel.

London, June 4.—Special despatch to the London Times contradict the report that there is less cordiality in the relations between the French and German Governments since the election of General Macdonald President.

The Times in an editorial, designated the proposed alteration of the Bank Act as an attack on the sanctity of contracts and an entire subversion of the cardinal principle, which has hitherto been regarded as the key note of business.

Great preparations are making in the city for the reception of the Shah of Persia.

A memorial statue of the late Earl of Derby was unveiled at Preston yesterday, and another of Sir Robert Peel was inaugurated at Huddersfield on the same day.

A strike of the carpenters of London is threatened.

UNITED STATES AFFAIRS.

Losses by Fire.

PHILADELPHIA, June 4.—By the burning of John Brown & Son's woolen mill this morning, 1,720 bales were destroyed, and 1,000 more were taken out of employment. The loss is estimated at \$100,000.

Philadelphia, June 4.—Stewart & Sons had their factory at the corner of Broad and Andrew streets, was totally destroyed by fire. Loss \$60,000. They were insured for \$30,000.

Deaths of Railway Directors.

Albany, June 4.—At the election of Directors of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad, held yesterday, ten old officers were re-elected unopposed. There were about \$150,000,000 worth of stock represented at the election.

Bacon Park Races—Seizure of Race Horse.

Bacon, June 4.—At Bacon Park races, the first race for \$700 was won by "Lester," bearing six other horses, \$2,311. The second race for \$1,500 was won by "Jockey," bearing seven other horses, best time 2:25.

Under Mount Royal the Customs ser-

ved the varied Bacon Park yesterday, and took trapping horses, traps, traps and traps.

The Wheat Crop—No More Railway Passes.

New York, June 4.—The Commission of Agriculture reports the total estimated

production of wheat in the United States in 1872 at 249,497,000 bushels, an increase over the preceding year of 12,275,000. The largest production of any single State was that of California, 25,600,000 bushels. Secy. Mary Langdon, of the Milwaukee Chamber of Commerce, is the authority for the statement that the crop of 1872, based on wheat, including flour, had been received at Chicago, Milwaukee and other points, up to May 21st, from the crop of 1872 from Illinois, Wisconsin, Iowa and Minnesota, which, together with an estimated amount for food and seed still to come forward, will exceed the sum of \$100,000,000 bushels in wheat and flour.

At a meeting of the representatives of the various western railroads at Chicago yesterday, a resolution was unanimously adopted, declaring all outstanding passes valid until the 20th of June, and abrogating the time limit of three months. Employees over limit with whom they are connected, also those persons having previously acknowledged contract rights to free passes were excepted.
