Canada Railway Loan.

No period of the colonial history of Great Britain affords a parallel to the success which has attended the union of the British N. American Provinces. For years an terior to the passage of the Confederation Act in 1867, Canada, in spite of annually increasing taxation, was not able to make both ends meet; and Nova Scotia and New Brunswick could only carry out improvements in the form of railways and other public works by increasing their tariffs on the importation of British manufactures. In Canada the Government had come to a dead lock owing to sectional differ ness, and they sought relief from the difficulty by proposing confederation with Nova Scotia and New Brunswick ; but the latter would only consent to it on the condition that the immediate construction of the Intercolonial Railway should be made one of the first conditions of the Confederation Act, and that the cost of its construction should be provided for by a loan guaranteed by the Imperial Governa ment. That confederation has confuted the evil predictions of its opponents, and surpassed in success the most sanguine predictions of its supporters, is undeniable. On the second reading of the Canada Railway Loan Act in the House of Commons, in April, 1867, Mr. Lowe, in opposing the bill, concluded a very powerful speech by saying, that The thirteen old Colonies in America left us because we would insist on taxing them ; we should feel compelled to feave the new Colonies because they would in-The Daily News tollowed up the cry next day by saying that the sooner the Imperial Government funded the debt


