If Kingston men exacted demurrage for these delays, they could materially remove the present grievance, even without the aid of new elevators.

Mr. Keith having read extracts from United States papers setting forth in strong terms the superiority of Moutreal as an entrapot of the trade of the West, spoke in favor of the water route available as contrasted with the best facilities that could be offered by rail.

Mr. Woods, of Quebec, recognized the urgency of making all possible effort to secure the carrying trade of the West, by every means. The views of the people he represented were fully in accord with the sense of the resolution: His own idea that the water communication of the country was a more efficient and valuable auxiliary to the trade of the country than the lines of railway howgever good in their way.
