We trust, with Your Excellency, that our deliberations may be directed by wisdom and aided by Divine Providence.

It was ordered that the said Address be presented to His Excellency the Governor General, by such members of this House as are members of the Privy Council. Then, on motion of the Hon. Mr. LETELLIER DE ST. JUST, seconded by the Hon. Mr. SCOTT, The House adjourned.
