MR. EDGAR'S MISSION TO BRITISH COLUMBIA. We notice in our exchange from British Columbia, received yesterday, bearing date down to 3rd May, that the leading topic of discussion in that Province continues to be the Canadian Pacific Railway.

The London Free Press recommends the removal of the duty on American crude, or mineral oil, of \$2.50 a barrel, in advance of a Reciprocity Treaty, in order to the relief and encouragement of the Canadian oil trade.

The General Assembly of the Canada Presbyterian Church. WEDNESDAY, JUNE 3. MORNING SERVICES.

The Assembly met in Knox Church, at eleven o'clock, the Rev. Thomas McPherson, of Stratford, Moderator, presiding. According to a resolution of the previous sitting, the first hour was spent in religious exercises, consisting of prayer, reading of the Scriptures and psalms.

The Moderator read the minutes of the previous evening were read and sustained. The Clerk read a list of the changes in various presbyteries during the year, which was ordered to be recorded in the minutes.

The next business was the report of the Committee on Statistics, but before that was read.

Mr. Cook, of Stratford, presented the annual report of the Home Mission work performed in the past year, but it was not read in full, as it was expected that it would be read in full at the next meeting.

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Mr. J. A. McLean, Toronto, differed from the former speaker entirely, and went to the opposite extreme to-morrow to give reasons for so doing.

Mr. Morris, Montreal, said the people fully understood the question upon which they were asked to pronounce.

A congratulatory address to His Excellency the Governor General was also adopted by acclamation, and the Synod adjourned at 10 o'clock.
