It is designed to utilize these changes for the better schooling of the children, and to gradually raise the age at which they shall commence to work. These reforms are justified on the laudable ground of improving, by all legitimate means, the circumstances of the factory operatives. It is argued, reasonably enough, that as the original Acts of 25 years ago, shortening the hours of labor, did great good, by improving the health and comfort of the operatives, without diminishing the amount of work performed, the present further reduction will produce similar desirable results. It appears that the large proportion of seventy-four per cent. of these factory hands consists of women and children, the remaining 26 per cent. being of a considerable extent, but varying ages from 15 to 20.

While there were no differences of opinion in this country as to the desirability of reciprocity with the United States, it was to be expected that there would scarcely be cordial agreement between all classes, politicians, manufacturers, agriculturalists, and others, as to the precise value of such free trade relations and the extent to which they should be carried.

Supposing, however, it be true that the first step was taken by us, and that the draft of treaty is simply the proposal of the Canadian Government, what of it? We confess we don't see anything very alarming, or very humiliating in this circumstance. The proposition of reciprocity is that of enlightened legislation, a liberal commercial policy, relations of good neighborhood, a confession of mutual sympathy and common interest.
