We publish to-day a letter from Mr. W. D. LeSueur, in reference to our remarks on the critique in the Nation on the 'School Books of Canada.' Of course Mr. LeSueur has a perfect right to his opinion of the ability of the Nation's reviewer to discuss the subject of grammar, and so have we. It is hardly necessary to say, however, that we do not question his ability for a moment; in fact, we are proud to have quoted his criticisms as nearly verbatim as our space would admit. But what we do say is, as we have said before, that he is much more at home in pointing out the evils of the existing system than in finding a remedy for them. Let it be remembered that the reviewer who is dealing with the education imparted in our common schools—the education which is within the reach of the vast majority of the people of Canada, but beyond which they are not expected and generally unable to go.
