CHICAGO.

The Governor General's Visit.  
Chicago, Aug. 10.  
The Governor General and party arrived here this morning and were received by the Committee of the City Council. A grand dinner was afterwards held at the Grand Pacific Hotel, where addresses of welcome were delivered by Mayor Cziria, Governor Beveridge, George M. Howe, President of the Board of Trade, and others. The Government members followed the procession after dinner, and the party went out for a drive. The day was closed by a dinner given by Lord Dufferin, on board the Grand Encampment.

## UNITED STATES.

Lord Dufferin.

Chicago, Aug. 17.—Lord Dufferin, Governor General of Canada has been the guest of the city since Saturday. He visited the Board of Trade this morning, accompanied by his wife and his staff. The party were received with marked respectability by the members of the board, and on their departure were enthusiastic and cheering. They will spend the day in visiting the places of interest in the city.

CHICAGO, Aug. 17.—During his visit to the Board of Trade, to-day, Lord Dufferin made a speech, in which he said he considered the reception he had received as a striking proof of the friendly feeling existing between us and Canada. It would not become him, as Governor General of Canada, and simply a legislator of the United States, to express an opinion on any political question, but he could assert that the Government of Great Britain and that of Canada desired to pursue these policies that would tend to increase and develop the personal relations that now bind these powers to us. His government had a desire to make a treaty—a one-sided bargain was desirable or possible, and he believed our people were actuated by the same honorable sentiments in regard to Canada. It would ever be his most earnest wish to endeavor to promote the joint interests of the United States and Canada, and bring the two countries closer together.

Dufferin's remarks were frequently interrupted by cheers on the part of the Board.

## Coal.

PITTSFIELD, Aug. 17.—It is generally believed that there will be a suspension of the principal collieries in this region to-morrow until Sept. 1st, the supply of coal of the district already being in excess of the demand. A few enterprising dealers were despatched to the coal miners to-day, and the indications are that the suspension will soon become general.

## The Crops.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Aug. 17.—The extreme dry and hot weather for the past ten days has injured the crops all over the State to such an extent that not more than one-fourth of a crop is now expected to be raised, but the others are still at large. Great excitement prevails concerning the outcome.

## Toobacco.

LITTLE ROCK, Aug. 17.—The Courier Journal to-day publishes reports from correspondents in fifty counties of Kentucky representing 5 per cent. of the tobacco crop of the entire State. The reports indicate an unparalleled failure of the crop.

From an aggregate estimate, it is determined that the crop of 1874 will be 13 per cent. of last year's crop.

## NOTWITHSTANDING.

At 6 o'clock the American clubs began a game of base ball, which lasted till 8 o'clock. The contest was very keen, and resulted in a victory for the British club, the score standing, 130 to 124, Philadelphia, 17.
