It will be seen from the annotations to the first balance sheet, that the gentlemen who took charge of the Bank after its stoppage could find no such assets as those which were represented to be on hand by the published statement of its affairs. Instead of a large amount of spe cie some \$126,000, there were really less than \$4,000, and other assets seems to have reen either wholly imaginary or to have been less in amount and of very lifferent character, from the representation made to the public. If this strange discrepancy cannot be explained, and at resent it appears inexplicable, except apon the hypothesis of fraud, or of gross ignorance, or both—the discovery will strike a heavy blow at the faith which has been heretofore reposed in these sworn balance sheets of our banks. Other considerations, which as they affect the fortunes, and possibly, in one or two cases, still more than the fortunes of men greatly respected by the community are to the last degree painful, arise in this connection. It will probably be a question, with those who have bought stock in the bank upon the published statements of its situation, how far all whose name have authenticated the truth of these balance sheets are not civilly liable for the losses sustained in consequence thereof, and there must be at all events one or more persons, who cannot be supposed to have concurred in these statements without a criminal knowledge of their untruthfulness, which may lead to numiliating punishment.
