TORONTO.

Governor Green—Investigation—Before the Police Magistrate—Left for Paris Unknown—Philadelphian Centennial—Arrested—Judgment Against the City. TORONTO, Nov. 8.—Governor Green, of the 9th, is very sick. Investigation into the charges against the City Engineer was resumed this morning. Nothing was done, and the enquiry was adjourned till Thursday next. Michael Cahill, saloon keeper, who shot James Skelton for breaking into his place, was before the Police Magistrate this morning on a charge of assault. He is doing well and will probably shortly be given evidence in the case. M. A. The time for the exhibition of the Philadelphia Centennial has been extended from Nov. 1st to the 15th of December, all over the continent. REPLY TO THE SPEECH FROM THE THRONE.

On the first order of the House being called for, the consideration of His Excellency's speech at the opening of the Session: Mr. Phillip Landry, of Montserrat, in moving the adoption of an address in reply to the speech from the Throne, commenced with a brilliant exordium on the difficulty of his position and generally reviewed the speech from the Throne. He remarked on the importance of the Railway question, which he expected would occupy them for a considerable time during the Session. He briefly, but poetically referred to the climate, soil, beauty of scenery and importance of unification throughout the Province. He pointed out the duty of the members to consider the question and their duty to their constituents as they will have either to tell them "we have voted for this great enterprise, be fore God and before man we believed it to be necessary to the country, or we have voted against it because the country would be better off without it." With regard to the action of the Government, he felt that none could condemn it. The Government had not made any definite arrangement with the representatives.
