DOMINION LEGISLATURE.

Third Parliament—Third Session. HOUSE OF COMMONS. MONDAY, FEB. 21.

The SPEAKER took the chair at 3 o'clock.

MR. WOOD (Hamilton).—To amend the Act to authorize the incorporation of boards of trade in the Dominion of Canada.

MR. CHARLTON.—To amend the Act regarding the transportation of cattle.

Hon. Mr. SMITH brought down the supplementary report of the Marine and Fisheries Department.

Hon. Mr. MITCHELL asked of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, whether any steps had been taken to get the papers laid before the House, relating to these shipping interests, printed for distribution.

Hon. Mr. SMITH said he had not taken any such steps, but he would be very glad to have them printed.

Hon. Mr. MITCHELL moved that the papers be referred to the Printing Committee. Carried.

Hon. Mr. MACKENZIE (Cape Breton).—Asked of the Government whether they were constructing the Guyon Island Light House, for which an appropriation was made last year.

Hon. Mr. SMITH—Tenders were invited last summer, and a man by the name of Cameron sent in the lowest bid. He was notified accordingly, but he refused to enter into the contract. His bid was \$2,100. The next lowest was \$2,900, and the contract was awarded to that contractor, who has entered into the contract, and the light house will be finished by August next.
