THE Third Parliament-Third Session. HOUSE OF COMMONS. "London" FRIDAY, Feb. 25.

Hon. Dr. TUPPER rose to reply to the speech of Hon. Mr. Cartwright, and was received with applause. He commenced by referring at considerable length to the gloomy speeches Mr. Cartwright had made in 1874, and expressing surprise to hear him speak so hopefully now under so adverse circumstances, telling them that with a depleted treasury, commercial stringency, and depression in trade. there was no danger, that the Government was not to blame, and that everything would soon right itself. having on several occasions said that the Pacific Railroad had caused increased taxation, and quoted from Mr. Cartwright's speech in 1874 to show that he guaranteed the country that the increased mports would cover every necessary expenditure. If with his new taxes he had the same revenue as he foreshadowed in 1875 he would have derived a total sum of \$26,225,990. When Mr. Potter, of England, made his damaging statements against Canadian railways a fatal blow had been struck at our interests; and he would show that this gentlemen, who is said to have combined with those now in power to defeat the building of the Pacific Railway, had quoted Mr. Brydges' name and his opinn, to back him in his onslaught upon Canadian interests. Then again the Minister of Fnance in 1874 had said that he country would be ruined if the Pacific Railway was constructed, and the results would be deplorable in the extreme; but To Boarders either by the day or month, a scarce had the House settled down to business than an Act was placed upon the statutes providing for the building of the Pacific Railway. Next came Mr. Brown's Reciprocity Treaty, containing as it did, proposals that struck terror and dismay into the promoters of industries of the FIRE "ALHAMBRA," Dominion, and said it would be difficult to over-astimate the depression that this Brown mission caused. Then came the financial loan of 1874 and the imposition of \$20,000,000 of debt upon Canala The people had to pay the interest, and the money was not required. Another disastrous policy upon the part of the Finance Minister, was the issuance last summer of circular, which placed in the hands of ankers a weapon they could use to shut suddenly down on their customers if it was so desired.
