the heaviest ever produced in that county In Lancashire and the midland counties generally, the cold and wet weather has injured the wheat, though it is hoped that a fine warm June will materially improve the prospects of a crop. In West Norfolk, barley -so much used by the Burton brewers-has improved its appearance since the change in the weather and an average yield is promised. A fine hay crop is considered to be certain by many of the Lincolnshire and Norfolk farmers, the rainy spring having been beneficial in that respect, although it has adversely affected the lambing season. Nearer London, in the home counties, the frosts have nipped the wheat and greatly retarded farm work, but an average hay crop is expected. Barley and oats, though back ward, are strong and promising, and clover also looks well. In the south and south-east, a fair corn crop is anticipated with favourable weather; wheat, however, is thin and patchy in most parts. Grass and clover give signs of a very good crop. Hops in Kent gave a satifactory appear ance, having stood the severe weather remarkably well, and with a fine genial June will do well.
