## LOCAL NEWS.

POLICE COURT YESTERDAY.

Maurice Livet and Benjamin Beaurepaire were charged with fighting and disturbing the peace in the saloon of the latter the previous evening. Livet was drinking, got drunk, and grew quarrelsome in his cups, which is all he could be charged with; for it is all very well to spend money, but to quarrel, especially when the cash is gone, is quite a different thing. He therefore proceeded to eject his customer, and a fight was the result. Livet said the hotel keeper kicked him out; but Beaurepaire said he was thrown out, "a little pugil." The latter to illustrate his inoffensive way of doing the thing, he raised his foot in Court, and moved it gently forward, but could not do away with the impression that he actually did kick him, and so he was sentenced to pay a fine of \$2 and costs.

WILLIAM MORRISON was found drunk on the streets, between the hours of one and two o'clock yesterday morning. He could not account for his being asleep, and was fined \$2 and costs.

THEOPHILE LANDRIEU was charged with assaulting himself by kicking N. Mathieu, and jumping on his body when down. Several witnesses were called for the defence, but he had to pay the usual fine of \$2 and costs.

BURGESS BAUCAIRE, son of the late Burgess, was charged with assaulting his father on Tuesday morning. He wanted a quarter to get his hair cut, and when refused he demanded a drink. This reasonable request having been also refused, Burgess' son went to the bar and grasped a bottle.
