The bookworm

by Shirley Whittington The Bookworm's diet this week is a mixed one — three books which have little in common except that they've all been around for a while, and each is sought after for its own reasons.

Jaws by Peter Benchley seems to be the current paperback favourtie. It's a fast moving novel about a Long Island resort town where the economy depends on the summer tourist trade. When a giant killer shark inexplicably arrives offshore and begins to dine on local swimmers, business begins to look bad.

The mayor, who is also the local real estate entrepreneur, pressures the chief of police to keep the beaches open. It develops that he's tied up with a different kind of killer - a loan shark - and falling real estate values spell his ruin. Benchley takes us through
