the Stoneleigh Motors softball team, and Lloyd Leroux all called on the board to recommend the installation to council.

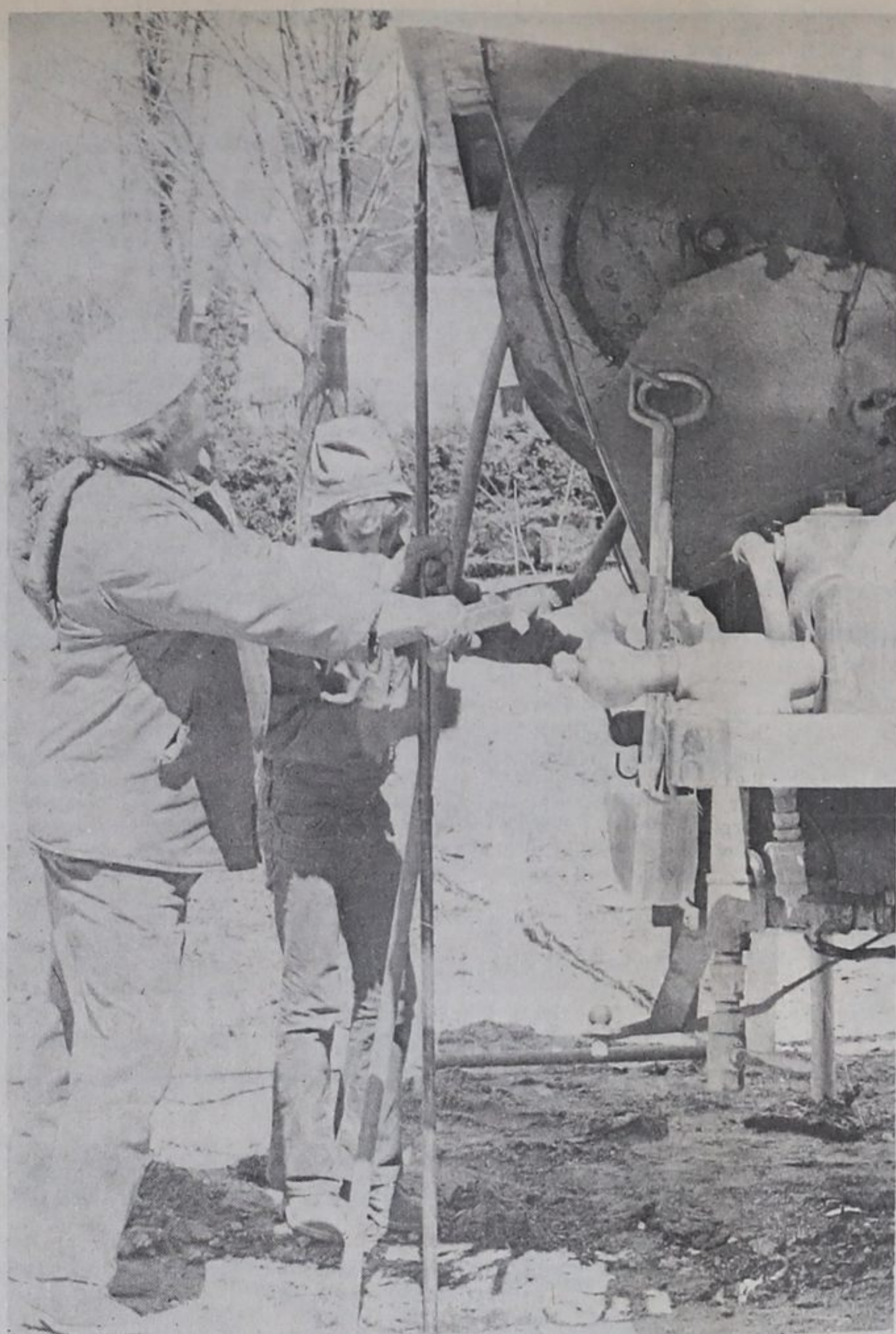
The total cost could approach \$20,000 and without mentioning a figure, the board recommended the installation.

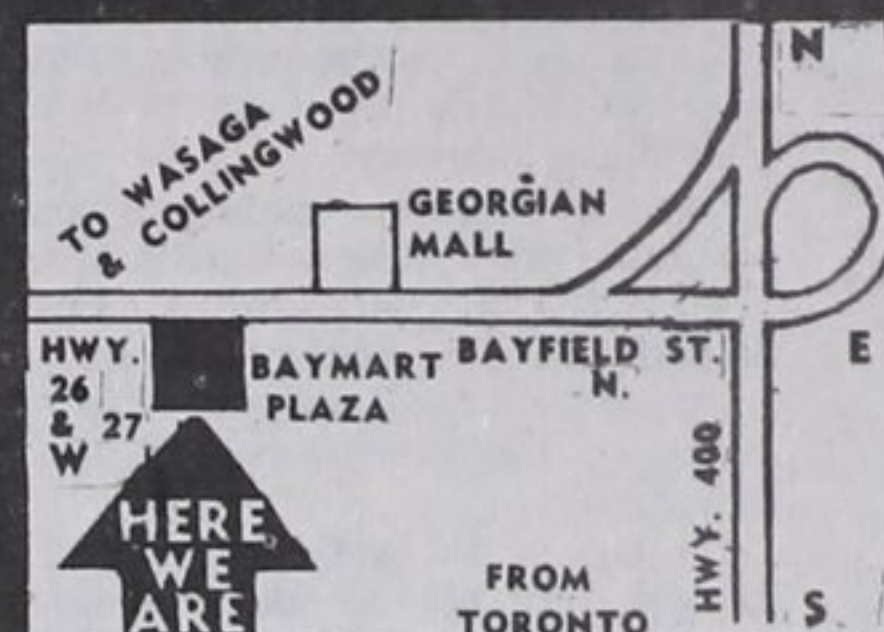

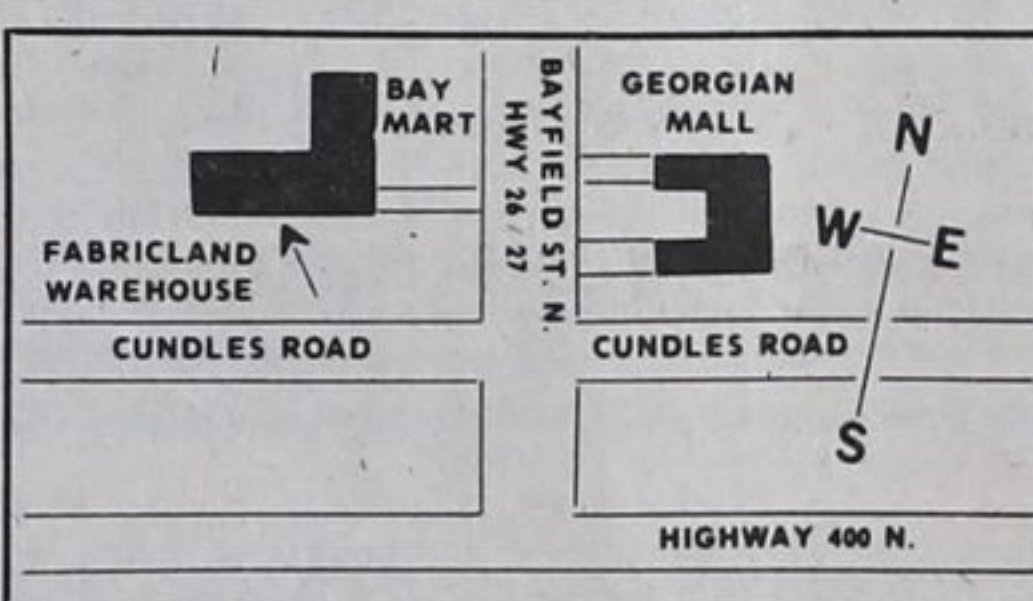
