Costs up but retail price down

Potato producer price squeeze

by Dave McCausland The potato producer in North Simcoe is caught in a price squeeze between declining retail prices and rising equipment and supply costs. Many have significant quantities of potatoes they cannot sell for enough to pay for the packaging and shipping, let alone the actual

cost of production. One of the Tiny Township farmers caught in this situation is Gabriel Maurice. He has been growing potatoes for 35 years and says "I've never seen it so bad." He has been unable to get \$1.25 for a 75 pound bag of potatoes - which costs him over \$2.00 to produce. And if he hopes to sell those potatoes in Toronto he will have to take a 50 cent shipping charge and the 35 cents cost of the bag itself out of the \$1.25 they are willing to pay. Forty cents is left to offset his \$2.00 production cost.

Maurice blames part of the problem on the shipment of potatoes from Prince Edward Island to Ontario. The Federal Government subsidizes the cost of shipping those potatoes and so they are able to compete with the locally grown product. He said the PEI farmer isn't reaping the benefits of this subsidy, however, since he is also barely getting the cost of production back from his



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
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
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
