



The park

The above proposal for the development of Penetanguishene's approved waterfront park was presented to council last night by parks chairman Ron Bellisle. It marks a sharp departure from the existing plan, prepared by another firm in 1970, by calling for "active" as opposed to "passive" use of much of the site. As shown above, the future could see a new arena on the

right, behind the present Aquarobic plant, a doubling in the dock capacity and amount of usable beach, baseball diamonds, tennis courts and a football field. To date, work on the park has cost exactly \$224,245.01; of which town ratepayers have paid less than \$6,500. The rest has come from federal and provincial government grants, private donations, and revenues generated.

Price of boat slips at dock will increase 50 per cent

The price of boat slips at the Penetanguishene town dock will jump 50 per cent, from two to three cents per foot per day, but the increase will still leave the cost well below that of other municipalities in the area.

Midland charges \$75 per year for rental at its dock, while the average price in Penetanguishene over the season stands at \$40.

Another surplus For the tenth straight year, Penetanguishene has ended up with a surplus of revenue to add to its cash reserves, with the figure for 1974 standing at \$13,000. Capital expenditures for the year totalled \$412,000, down slightly from the 1973

Midland council to appeal court ruling

Midland council decided Monday afternoon that it will appeal a decision by Supreme Court judge J. Callon, who last week dismissed an action initiated by the town against three developers of the Huronia mall on Highway 27 just west of the town limits.

The action was taken in the spring of 1974, when the town sought to obtain an injunction against the developers to prevent them from using a tile bed construction on town property. The plaza property, explained town solicitor Doug Haig, lies approximately one quarter on town property and three quarters on Tiny Township land. When the developers sought a building permit from the township, no

application for a similar permit was made to the town of Midland. Because construction for the tile bed for the plaza sewage system was on town property, town officials felt that the developers should have applied for a building permit, he added. According to Haig, the area was zoned

for residential use and not commercial. "There is some question that had the developers applied for it, they might not have got it," he added. The tile bed was built without town approval. According to Haig, the judge dismissed the action on the basis of his interpretation of the town by

laws, which he felt did not require the obtaining of a permit. The appeal will be made through the Ontario Court of Appeal, though it is difficult to say when the case will come up in court, Haig said.
