Archie Bunker and Maude have become part of our folklore and apparently there's more to them than meets the eye. Along with Sanford and Son, Good Times and our own Excuse My French, these programs have centred on problems which would have made the producers of Father Knows Best blanch.

Heavy-handed messages about alcohol abuse, malnutrition, heart

disease and other ugly blisters on society's skin don't seem to have the universal impact of human interest humour.

Dick Davett's V.D. Blues (Don't give a dose to the one you love) resulted in an increase of 75 per cent in those seeking help at community clinics.

Edith's Christmas Story, a Bunker episode about breast cancer, was praised by the American Cancer Society. And the

National Association of Retarded Citizens has commended Gloria's Boyfriend which focussed on the problems of the mentally retarded.

Norman Lear, All in the Family's producer, says when people are laughing, their defenses are down. They accept entertainment more readily than sermons, Shaw and Moliere understood that.

L.O. O'Brien, in an article in Addictions magazine, suggests "Perhaps it's time to try Charlie Farquharson on a series of nutrition monologues. Or Stompin' Tom Connors doing the Seat Belt Song. Or a two-hour variety special on depression and mental health."

Food for thought - non-violent thought, at that. Do-it-yourself TV. In the nightly escape from reality, entertainment seekers often overlook radio as a source of diversion. It was proven, way back in the days of Inner Sanctum and Lux Radio Theatre, that a good story can be told effectively without a picture to go along with it. Radio drama is do-it-yourself television. Imagination supplies the picture and there is the added advantage that the narrative is not constantly interrupted by pitches for cheese spread and hair spray, not on CBC, anyway.

It All Ends Up in A Shopping Bag, Paul Kligman's moving story about his father, a Winnipeg grocer, grew out of a CBC radio play aired in 1973. It's being rebroadcast on CBC Tuesday night (May 27) at 8:03. If you miss the AM version, you can pick it up on Thursday on FM.

Kligman is an accomplished actor and singer (and now, writer) whom you may have seen most recently in the Wayne and Shuster special on money. He plays his own father on the CBC dramatization of It All Ends up in a Shopping Bag.

Canada-Five Portraits If your vacation plans have been scrapped by inflation, you can take a week-long look at Canada on the tube, starting Sunday, May 25 at 8 p.m. CTV is re-telescoping a five part series (Canada - Five Portraits) which will explore the country in terms of its five basic geographic regions.

Gordon Pinsent narrates. Louis Applebaum does the music and writers include George Ryga and Barry Callaghan. That's a lot of good Canadian talent and with magnificently varied scenery as the supporting cast, it is not surprising to learn that the series won six major international awards the year it was produced - 1973. 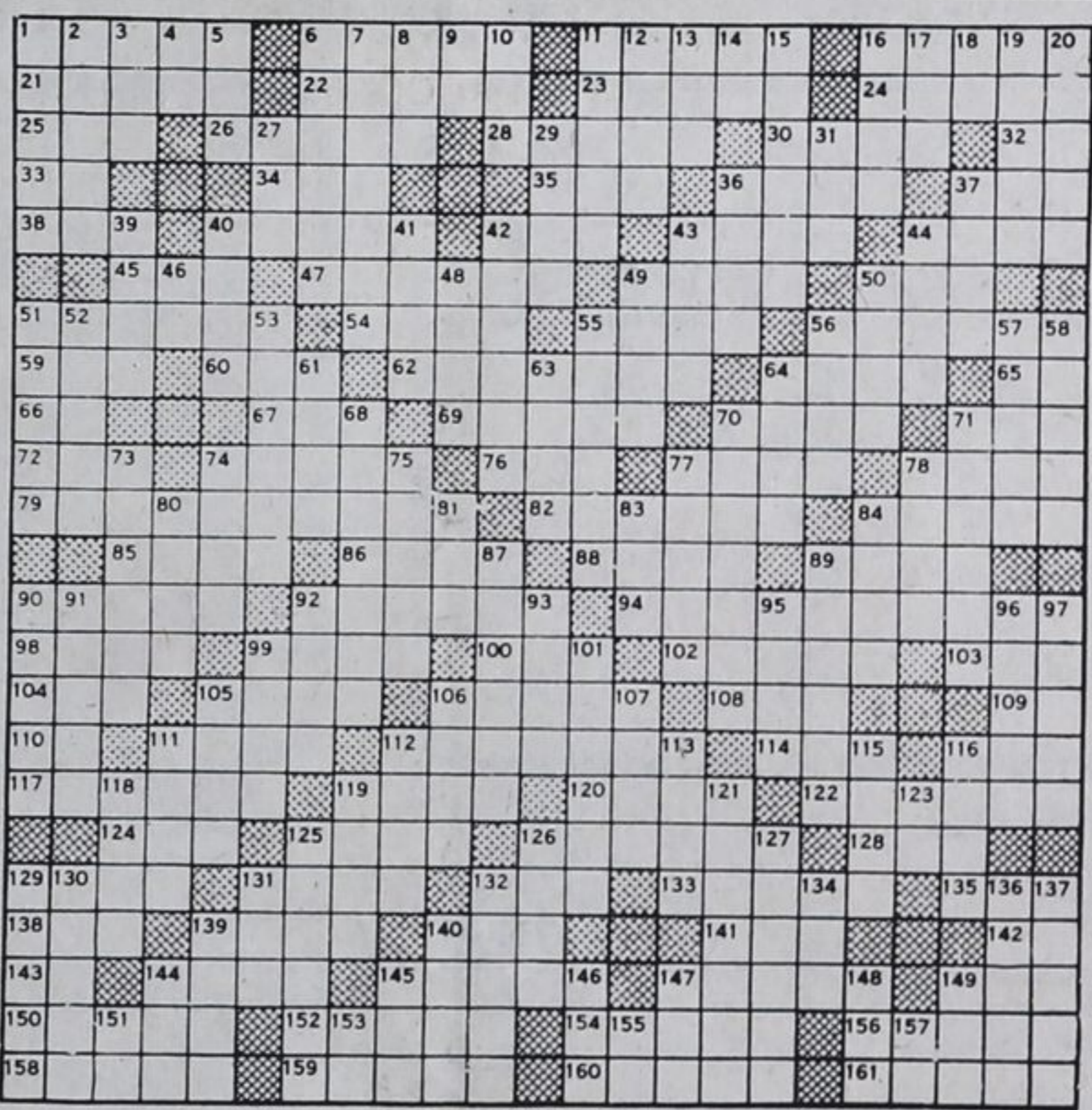

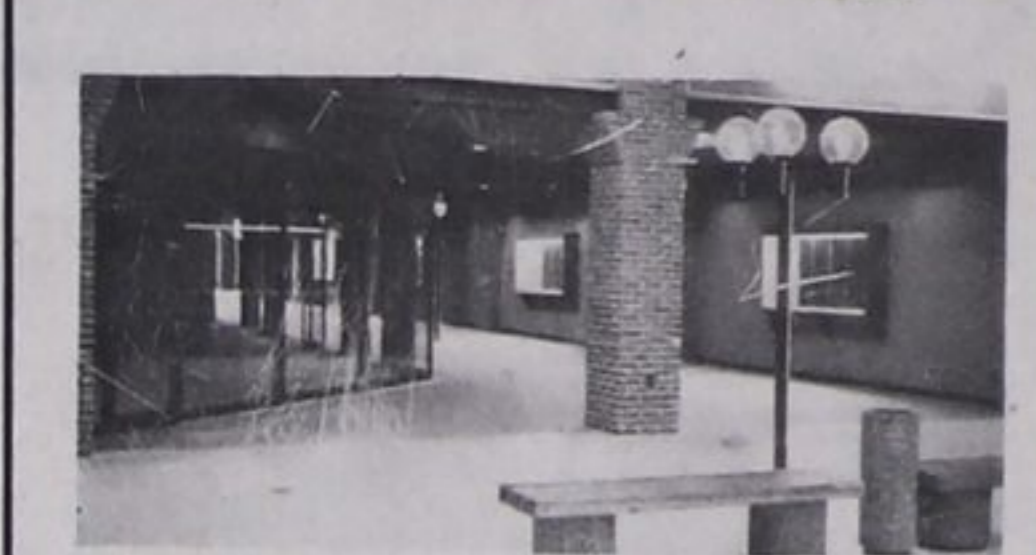

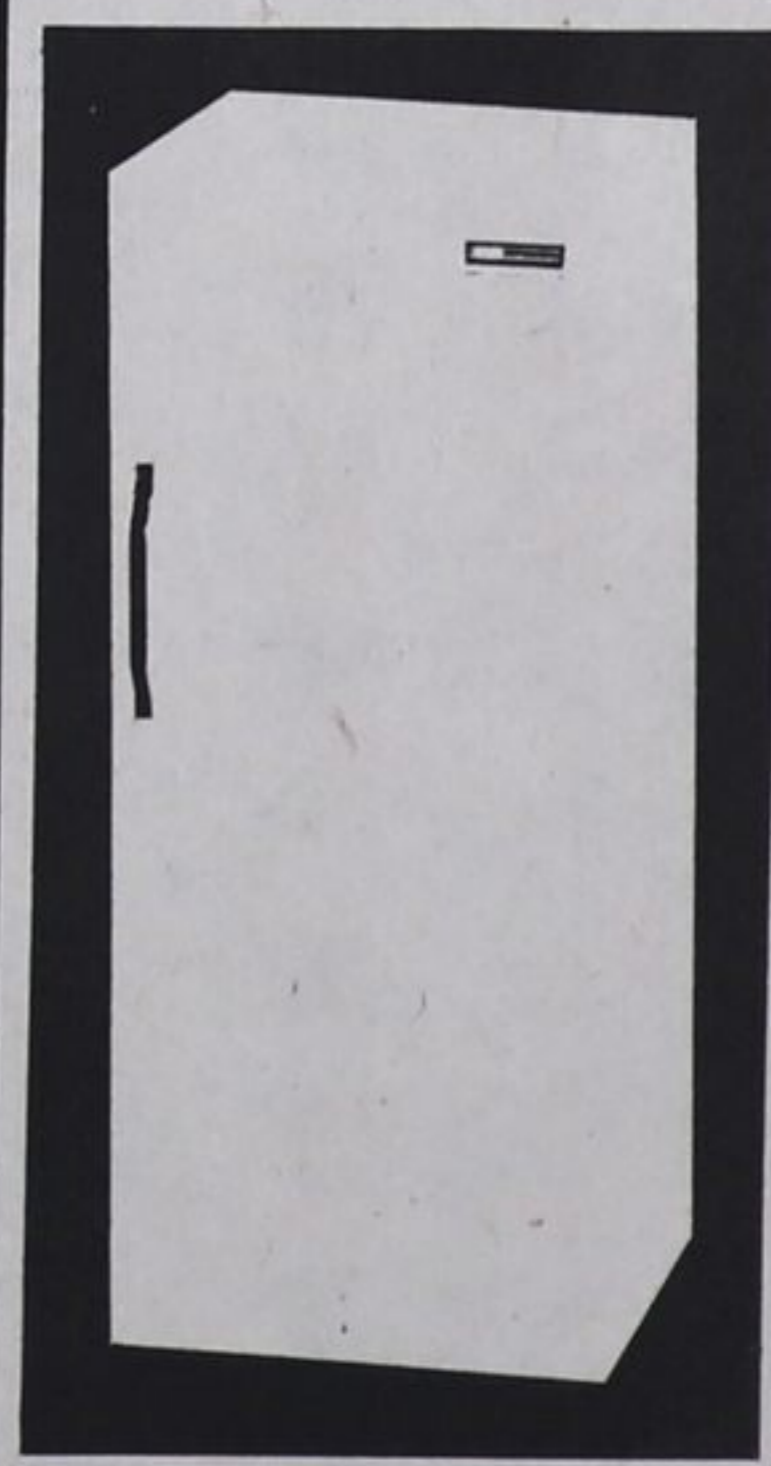
